

Tour Summary

Our comprehensive Bali tour was a resounding success! We recorded a fabulous 163 species including a

good number of near-endemics and Bali's only endemic (and one of the world's rarest birds to boot), the magnificent Bali Myna!

On our first afternoon we all met up at our comfortable ecolodge in the wooded outskirts of Denpasar. Some participants had just arrived in Bali from their international flights and the rest of us had recently flown in from Manado, after having completed a fabulous Sulawesi & Halmahera tour. Everyone had arrived in good time and after enjoying a delicious lunch we ventured out to the nearby Serangan Island to enjoy some bonus birding. The mudflats, mangroves and surrounding grassland here rewarded us with great

sightings in the good, late afternoon light. Some of the highlights included a good number of Sunda Teal, Little Pied and Little Black Cormorants, Australian Pelican – a nice surprise, sneaky Ruddy-breasted Crake,

a plethora of waders including splendid Beach Stonecurlew and Javan and the very sought-after Oriental Plover, smashing Little Tern in full breeding plumage, Island Collared Dove, Savanna Nightjar, Cave Swiftlet hawking insects over the ponds, and cracking Cerulean Kingfisher. What a great start!

The following morning, after enjoying an early breakfast, we headed out towards Bali Barat National Park. Our first stop at some rice paddies produced the desired Javan Kingfisher and Javan and White-headed Munias. Our next stop at Batukaru Temple was most rewarding as we explored the surrounding forest patches with great sightings of Rusty-breasted Cuckoo,

wonderful birding around our very comfortable accommodation, where we also enjoyed the most delicious

meals! Some of the species seen included the striking Green Junglefowl, Lesser Adjutant, Great-billed Heron, Changeable Hawk-Eagle, Crested Goshawk, Barred Buttonquail, a flock of dainty Black-naped Tern, Ruddy Cuckoo-Dove, Orange-breasted Green Pigeon, Chestnut-breasted Malkoha, Square-tailed Drongo-Cuckoo, cryptic Sunda Scops Owl, Largetailed Nightjar, stunning Oriental Dwarf Kingfisher, Chestnut-headed Bee-eater, Freckle-breasted Woodpecker, scope views of Yellow-throated Hanging Parrot, beautiful Javan Banded Pitta seen on several occasions, Javan Cuckooshrike, Small Minivet, Mangrove Whistler, Racket-tailed Treepie, Horsfield's Bush Lark, Ruby-throated Bulbul and endangered Black-winged Starling. One of the major highlights

Flame-fronted and Blue-eared Barbet, Bar-winged Prinia, brief Lesser Shortwing, smart White-crowned Forktail, confiding Little Spiderhunter and Orangebellied Flowerpecker.

After breaking for a welcome lunch, we meandered through rice paddies to our destination of Bali Barat National Park.

We then enjoyed a fantastic three days in Bali Barat NP, exploring the array of habitats including dry forest around our lodge, the nearby estuary, mangroves and salt works, the peninsula with its impressive woodland and grassland, and, finally, the fabulous rainforest for which this area is particularly renowned. Highlights of our stay here included the

was finding the very shy Sunda Thrush, which gave good views for all.

Bali's only endemic, the Critically Endangered Bali Myna, has fortunately recovered from a mere 7 wild birds to the current 42, with a further 200 in a captive breeding programme. This spectacular species showed particularly well for us and we even managed to find two birds that were unbanded, a great sign that there has been some recent breeding success!

A good selection of mammals were also enjoyed on the island including Ebony Leaf Monkey, which is endemic to Java and Bali, impressive Black Giant Squirrel, Common Muntjac, Rusa Deer and Wild Boar.



Leaving the lowlands we next headed for picturesque Bedugul, in the central highlands. A stop at Buyan Lake en route yielded Yellow Bittern, Javan Pond Heron in breeding plumage (what a bird!), White-browed Crake and migrant Long-toed Stint.

The beautiful climate and lush forests around Bedugul were a welcome change to the hot and humid lowlands. Exploring the network of trails and roads in the Botanical Gardens was most enjoyable as we continued to bolster our ever-growing birdlist. Some notable sightings included superb Black Eagle, flocks of Grey-cheeked Green Pigeon, Dark-backed Imperial Pigeon, elusive Sunda Cuckoos, highly elusive Javan Owlet (which for once gave outstanding views), Indonesian Honeyeater, Lesser Cuckooshrike, cute Sunda Warbler, Mees's White-eye, shy Javan Whistling Thrush, Fulvous-chested Jungle Flycatcher and Blood-breasted Flowerpecker. Not a bad tally indeed!

After toasting our success with a final (and scrumptious!) celebratory dinner, and enjoying a well-deserved good night's sleep, the following day some of the participants caught their departure flights home, while for those of us continuing on the Lesser Sundas tour, we hopped on a plane and flew to Waingapu, Sumba.

Thanks to a really great group of enthusiastic and fun participants as well as a superb ground operations team; I am greatly looking forward to travelling with you all again in the future!

(Personal note: This brief tour works particularly well as an extension to our Sulawesi & Halmahera and/or Lesser Sundas tours and comes highly recommended!)

Herons, Bitterns Ardeidae

Yellow Bittern

Ixobrychus sinensis

We enjoyed superb views of two at Buyan Lake near Bedugul.

Striated (Little) Heron

Butorides striata

Several birds were seen in the mangroves at Serangan Island with scattered sightings elsewhere.

Javan Pond Heron

Ardeola speciosa

We had many scattered sightings including breeding-plumage birds in paddyfields throughout the tour.

Eastern Cattle Egret

Bubulcus coromandus

This widespread species was commonly encountered throughout the tour in open fields.

Great-billed Heron

Ardea sumatrana

One of these giant birds was seen during our boat trip to the Peninsula in Bali Barat NP and another was seen at Gilimanuk Bay.

Purple Heron

We enjoyed scattered sightings throughout the tour of this widespread species.

Great Egret

We had superb sightings of fifty at Serangan Island and scattered sightings elsewhere during the trip.

Little Egret

At least thirty were seen at Serangan Island.

Pelicans Pelecanidae

Australian Pelican

We enjoyed great scope views of two at Serangan Island.

Cormorants, shags Phalacrocoracidae

Little Pied Cormorant

We had good scope views of fifty at Serangan Island.

Little Black Cormorant

Phalacrocorax sulcirostris

We had good scope views of fifteen at Serangan Island.

Kites, Hawks & Eagles Accipitridae

Crested Serpent Eagle

We enjoyed great views of two in Bali Barat NP.

Changeable Hawk-Eagle

We had a most memorable sighting of a pale morph whilst enjoying a sumptuous breakfast at the Menjangan, Bali Barat NP.

Black Eagle

This majestic eagle was seen very well soaring low over the forest at Bedugul Botanical Gardens.



Crested Goshawk

We had great views of several at Serangan Island with scattered sightings elsewhere.

Ruddy-breasted Crake

Porzana fusca

We had excellent views of two at Serangan Island.

White-browed Crake

Porzana cinerea

We enjoyed great scope views of two at Buyan Lake.

Common Moorhen

Gallinula chloropus

We had good scope views of thirty at Buyan Lake.

Dusky Moorhen

Gallinula tenebrosa

We had superb views of five at Buyan Lake.

Buttonquail Turnicidae

Barred Buttonquail

Turnix suscitator

One female showed extremely well at Grojogan Forest.

Stone-curlews, Thick-knees Burhinidae

Beach Stone-curlew

Esacus magnirostris

We had good scope views of two at Serangan Island.

Plovers Charadriidae

Pacific Golden Plover

Pluvialis fulva

We had great scope views of six at Gilimanuk.

Little Ringed Ployer

Charadrius dubius

Two were scoped and seen very well at Serangan Island.

Javan Plover (NE)

Charadrius javanicus

We had superb scope views of three at Serangan Island.

Lesser Sand Plover

Charadrius mongolus

Two birds were seen at Serangan Island.

Greater Sand Plover

Charadrius leschenaultii

We had wonderful sightings of thirty at Serangan Island.

Oriental Plover

Charadrius veredus

A fabulous 10 birds were seen exceptionally well at Serangan Island and a further six at Gilimanuk.

Sandpipers, Snipes Scolopacidae

Black-tailed Godwit

Limosa limosa

We had great views of one at Serangan Island.



Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus

Several were seen at Serangan Island and a few at Gilimanuk bay.

Common Redshank

Tringa totanus

At least two birds were seen at Serangan Island.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

We had good scope views of two at Serangan Island.

Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

We had great views of one at Serangan Island.

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

We observed two at Serangan Island.

Grey-tailed Tattler *Tringa brevipes*

We had good scope views of one at Serangan Island.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

Twenty were seen at Serangan Island.

Long-toed Stint Calidris ferruginea

We had wonderful views of two at Buyan Lake.

Gulls, Terns & Skimmers Laridae

Greater Crested Tern Thalasseus bergii

A flock of 10 was seen at Serangan Island and several more at Gilimanuk bay.

Little Tern Sternula albifrons

A flock of twenty was seen at Serangan Island.

Black-naped Tern Sterna sumatrana

We had wonderful views of a flock of twenty near Menjangan Island.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

One was seen near Menjangan Island.

Pigeons, Doves Columbidae

Rock Dove Columba livia

Seen in small numbers in the larger towns and cities

Island Collared DoveStreptopelia bitorquata

We had great sightings of up to twenty daily in Bali Barat NP.

Spotted Dove *Spilopelia chinensis*

This common species was regularly seen in secondary habitat throughout the tour.

Ruddy Cuckoo-Dove *Macropygia emiliana*

We had wonderful scope views of three birds in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Common Emerald Dove Chalcophaps indica

One was seen briefly at Grojogan Forest.

Zebra Dove Geopelia striata

At least twenty were seen on the peninsula in Bali Barat NP.

Pink-necked Green Pigeon Treron vernans

A flock of twenty was scoped near Bali Barat NP.

Orange-breasted Green Pigeon Treron bicinctus

One was seen very well near Bali Barat NP.

Grey-cheeked Green PigeonTreron griseicauda



Small numbers were seen daily in Bedugul Botanical Gardens and at Bali Barat NP.

Green Imperial Pigeon

Three birds were seen near Bali Barat NP.

Dark-backed Imperial Pigeon (NE)

Ducula lacernulata

We had superb scope views of three in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Cuckoos Cuculidae

Ducula aenea

Greater Coucal Centropus sinensis

One was seen well but briefly in Bali Barat NP.

Chestnut-breasted Malkoha Phaenicophaeus curvirostris

We had brief views of two in Bali Barat NP.

Rusty-breasted Cuckoo Cacomantis sepulcralis

We had superb scope views of one at Batukaru Temple.

Square-tailed Drongo-CuckooSurniculus lugubris

One was seen well but briefly in Bali Barat NP.

Moustached Hawk-Cuckoo Hierococcyx vagans

We had good views of one at Batukaru Temple.

Sunda Cuckoo Cuculus lepidus

One was seen flying over a forest clearing in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Barn Owls Tytonidae

Western Barn Owl

Tyto alba

We had cracking views of one in Bali Barat NP.

Owls Strigidae

Sunda Scops Owl

Otus lempiji

A fabulous bird was seen exceptionally well at its day roost in Bali Barat NP.

Javan Owlet (NE)

Glaucidium castanopterum

After a great deal of effort this tricky species was seen phenomenally well in Bedugul.

Nightjars Caprimulgidae

Large-tailed Nightjar

Caprimulgus macrurus

Two birds showed well in Bali Barat NP.

Savanna Nightjar

Caprimulgus affinis

Our first sighting was of two birds at Serangan Island. We later had good views of another at

Gilimanuk.

Treeswifts Hemiprocnidae

Grev-rumped Treeswift

Hemiprocne longipennis

Up to five were seen daily in Bali Barat NP.

Swifts Apodidae

Cave Swiftlet (NE)

Collocalia linchi

This species was commonly encountered at all forest sites with peak numbers in excess of 50 daily.

Edible-nest Swiftlet

Aerodramus fuciphagus



Seen almost daily with a peak count of over 100 daily

House Swift Apus nipalensis

A flock of thirty was seen at Gilimanuk.

Rollers Coraciidae

Oriental Dollarbird

Eurystomus orientalis

Two birds were seen in Bali Barat NP.

Kingfishers Alcedinidae

Javan Kingfisher (NE)

Halcyon cyanoventris

We had great views of nine in rice paddies en route from Denpasar to Bali Barat NP.

Collared Kingfisher

Todiramphus chloris

This widespread species was common throughout the tour in degraded habitats.

Sacred Kingfisher

Todiramphus sanctus

One was seen at Serangan Island.

Cerulean (Small Blue) Kingfisher

Alcedo coerulescens

A fabulous three birds were seen at Serangan Island.

Oriental Dwarf (Rufous-backed) Kingfisher

Ceyx erithaca

We had amazing views of two of this colourful gem in Bali Barat NP.

Bee-eaters Meropidae

Blue-tailed Bee-eater

Merops philippinus

A bird of open habitats, we had daily sightings of small numbers in Bali Barat NP.

Chestnut-headed Bee-eater

Merops leschenaulti

We observed up to six daily in Bali Barat NP.

Hornbills Bucerotidae

Oriental Pied Hornbill

Anthracoceros albirostris

A fabulous ten were seen in Bali Barat NP.

Barbets Megalaimidae

Lineated Barbet

Megalaima lineata

Up to three were seen daily in Bali Barat NP.

Flame-fronted Barbet (NE)

Megalaima armillaris

We had superb views of three at Batukaru Temple and a further six at Bedugul.

Blue-eared Barbet

Megalaima australis

We had great views of two at Batukaru Temple.

Coppersmith Barbet

Megalaima haemacephala

Up to five were seen daily in Bali Barat NP.

Woodpeckers Picidae

Sunda Pygmy Woodpecker

Dendrocopos moluccensis

One was seen by some at Udayana Ecolodge, Denpasar

Freckle-breasted Woodpecker

Dendrocopos analis

We had good sightings of one at Bedugul and up to three daily in Bali Barat NP.



Note: Some authorites split this species from Fulvous-breasted Woodpecker, D. macei. Clements does not yet accept this split.

Common Flameback Dinopium javanense

We heard several in Bali Barat NP.

Javan (Greater) Flameback Chrysocolaptes strictus

We heard one calling in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Parrots Psittacidae

Yellow-throated Hanging Parrot (NE)

Loriculus pusillus

Our first sighting was brief views of one flying over Batukaru Temple. We enjoyed great perched views of another feeding in a flowering *Erythrina* tree at Bali Barat NP.

Red-breasted Parakeet

Psittacula alexandri

We had superb views of six including scope views of a pair in woodland near Bali Barat NP.

Pittas Pittidae

Javan Banded Pitta

Hydrornis guajanus

This year we had outrageous views of this beauty on three separate occasions. It can often be an extremely difficult bird to observe. This was definitely one of the highlights of the trip!

Honeyeaters Meliphagidae

Indonesian Honeyeater (NE)

Lichmera limbata

We enjoyed great views of one in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Australasian Warblers Acanthizidae

Golden-bellied Gerygone

Gerygone sulphurea

Two birds were seen very well at Serangan Island.

Woodshrikes & Allies Tephrodornithidae

Black-winged Flycatcher-shrike

Hemipus hirundinaceus

We had fantastic views of two on consecutive days in Bali Barat NP.

Woodswallows Artamidae

White-breasted Woodswallow

Artamus leucorynchus

This widespread species was commonly seen in Bali Barat NP in secondary habitats.

Ioras Aegithinidae

Common Iora

Aegithina tiphia

Our first encounters with this widespread Asian species were at our hotel in Denpasar. Up to eight were also seen daily in Bali Barat NP.

Cuckooshrikes Campephagidae

Javan Cuckooshrike (NE)

Coracina javensis

We had good but brief views of one on the peninsula in Bali Barat NP and later enjoyed stunning views of a pair alongside the road near Bali Barat NP.

Lesser Cuckooshrike

Coracina fimbriata



Often a scarce bird, we had one sighting of this attractive cuckooshrike in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

White-shouldered Triller

Lalage sueurii

This species was commonly seen in Bali Barat NP where we had good views of several daily. A peak count was 20 at Gilimanuk.

Small Minivet

Pericrocotus cinnamomeus

A flock of ten was seen on the peninsula in Bali Barat NP.

Whistlers & Allies Pachycephalidae

Mangrove Whistler

Pachycephala cinerea

This species was seen well on one occasion in Bali Barat NP.

Rusty-breasted (Australian Golden) Whistler

Pachycephala pectoralis

A lovely male was seen in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Note: Some authorities split this species as Rusty-breasted Whistler, P. Clements has recently accepted this split and IOC does not recognize this split.

Shrikes Laniidae

Long-tailed Shrike

Lanius schach

Small numbers were seen daily in and around Bali Barat NP.

Figbirds, Orioles Oriolidae

Black-naped Oriole

Oriolus chinensis

A widespread and often common species, small numbers were seen in Bali Barat NP.

Drongos Dicruridae

Black Drongo

Dicrurus macrocercus

Small numbers were seen in rice fields and we had good views of one perched at Serangan Island.

Ashy Drongo

Dicrurus leucophaeus

Several sightings were had in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens and in Bali Barat NP.

Greater Racket-tailed Drongo

Dicrurus paradiseus

A splendid bird sporting full rackets was seen in Bali Barat NP.

Fantails Rhipiduridae

[Malaysian] Pied Fantail

Rhipidura javanica

Our first sightings were of two at Serangan Island and several birds were seen daily in Bali Barat NP.

Monarchis Monarchidae

Black-naped [Pale Blue] Monarch

Hypothymis azurea

A few were seen in Bali Barat NP.

Crows, Jays Corvidae

Racket-tailed Treepie

Crypsirina temia

We had fabulous views of three birds in Bali Barat NP.

Slender-billed Crow

Corvus enca

Two were seen flying near Serangan Island.



Fairy Flycatchers Stenostiridae

Grey-headed Canary-flycatcher

Culicicapa ceylonensis

Two birds were seen very well in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Tits, Chickadees Paridae

Cinereous Tit

Parus cinereus

Small numbers were seen daily at Bedugul and in Bali Barat NP.

Larks Alaudidae

Horsfield's (Australasian) Bush Lark

Mirafra javanica

We had good views of three on the Bali Barat NP peninsula.

Bulbuls Pycnonotidae

Ruby-throated Bulbul (NE)

Pycnonotus dispar

We had good views of two at Grojogan Forest.

Sooty-headed Bulbul

Pycnonotus aurigaster

At least six birds were seen at Gilimanuk.

Yellow-vented Bulbul

Pycnonotus goiavier

This species was particularly common throughout the tour with daily totals often reaching fifty birds.

Grey-cheeked Bulbul

Alophoixus bres

This species was seen briefly at Batukaru Temple and in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Swallows, Martins Hirundinidae

Barn Swallow

Hirundo rustica

One bird was seen at Gilimanuk.

Pacific Swallow

Hirundo tahitica

We had good views of a pair at Ubud.

Striated Swallow

Cecropis striolata

One was seen at the Bali Barat NP peninsula and another was seen at Ubud.

Cettia Bush Warblers and allies Cettiidae

Mountain Tailorbird

Phyllergates cuculatus

We heard one calling in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Leaf warblers and allies Phylloscopidae

Mountain Leaf Warbler

Phylloscopus trivirgatus

We had great views of several in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Sunda Warbler (NE)

Seicercus grammiceps

We had superb views of three in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Grassbirds and allies Locustellidae

Javan Bush Warbler

Locustella montis

We heard one calling at Bedugul.

Striated Grassbird

Megalurus palustris



Two birds were seen well at Buyan Lake.

Cisticolas and allies Cisticolidae

Zitting Cisticola

Cisticola juncidis

Another widespread species, several birds were seen in rice paddies.

Golden-headed Cisticola

Cisticola exilis

Two were seen in rice paddies en route from Denpasar to Bali Barat NP and a further three at Ubud.

Bar-winged Prinia (NE)

Prinia familiaris

We had great views of two at Batukaru Temple.

Olive-backed Tailorbird (NE)

Orthotomus sepium

We had good views of a few at our hotel in Denpasar and several more in Bali Barat NP.

Babblers Timaliidae

Chestnut-backed Scimitar Babbler

Pomatorhinus montanus

We heard several in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Crescent-chested Babbler (NE)

Stachyris melanothorax

We had brief views of several in Bali Barat NP.

White-eyes Zosteropidae

Mees's White-eye (Grey-throated Ibon) (NE)

Lophozosterops javanicus

This species was pleasantly common in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens where we observed at least 8 birds daily.

Oriental White-eye

Zosterops palpebrosus

We had great views of six at Batukaru Temple.

Mountain White-eve

Zosterops montanus

A couple was seen in the gardens of our hotel at Bedugul.

Lemon-bellied White-eye

Zosterops chloris

We found this species to be common at the Bali Barat NP peninsula where we recorded twenty

Starlings, Rhabdornis Sturnidae

Short-tailed Starling

Aplonis minor

We enjoyed good sightings of up to thirty daily in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Javan (White-vented) Myna

Acridotheres javanicus

After some effort we enjoyed good views of two at Serangan Island and several at Gilimanuk.

Black-winged Starling (NE)

Acridotheres melanopterus

We had great views of up to 22 in Bali Barat NP.

Bali Myna (E)

Leucopsar rothschildi

We had splendid views of several at our lodge in Bali Barat NP and several more on the Bali Barat peninsula. Two birds were seen without any rings. This was a major highlight of the tour, a real stunner and there are currently only 42 birds left in the wild. Fortunately an extensive breeding programme is underway and we hope that this beautiful bird will re-establish itself as a viable population in the wild.

Thrushes Turdidae

Javan Whistling Thrush (NE)

Myophonus glaucinus

We had good views of two in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.



Sunda Thrush Zoothera andromedae

We had stunning scope views of this rare species in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Rhinomyias olivaceus

We had great scope views of one in Bali Barat NP and another in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

White-crowned Forktail

Enicurus leschenaultia

We had good but brief views of one at Batukaru Temple.

Snowy-browed Flycatcher

Ficedula hyperythra

A male was seen very well in the Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Little Pied Flycatcher

Ficedula westermanni

We had wonderful views of several birds in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Pied Bush Chat

Saxicola caprata

A striking male was seen in the gardens of our hotel at Bedugul.

Flowerpeckers Dicaeidae

Orange-bellied Flowerpecker

Dicaeum trigonostigma

We enjoyed stunning views of a male at Betakaru Temple.

Blood-breasted Flowerpecker (NE)

Dicaeum sanguinolentum

This is a superb endemic that we encountered in Bedugul Botanical Gardens.

Scarlet-headed Flowerpecker

Dicaeum trochileum

We had superb views of a male in Bali Barat NP.

Sunbirds Nectariniidae

Olive-backed Sunbird

Cinnyris jugularis

This was a common species in secondary growth throughout the tour.

Little Spiderhunter

Arachnothera longirostra

We had superb views of one at Batukaru Temple.

Old World Sparrows Passeridae

Eurasian Tree Sparrow

Passer montanus

Commonly seen in larger towns and cities throughout the tour.

We had great sightings of 50 on the drive from Denpasar to Bali Barat NP and a further 100 at Ubud.

Scaly-breasted Munia (Nutmeg Mannikin)

This widespread species was found in the paddyfields throughout the tour.
