Trip Report

Our fourth and final tour to the Pantanal and Chapada dos Guimarães in 2015 enjoyed much the same success as the first three. That is to say that it was yet another superb trip! We witnessed the spectacle of thousands of birds and animals gathered around drying pools, delighted in boat cruise after boat cruise, snapped away a few thousand shots, marvelled at stunning scenery and bagged hundreds of great bird and mammal species, to boot, including Red-legged Seriema, Collared Crescentchest, Horned Sungem, Hyacinth Macaw, Jaguar and Giant Anteater! Our southern Amazon extension was also a fantastic success, reiterating what a must-see destination Cristalino is. There, inside and above some of the finest stretches of Amazon Rainforest around, we scoped dazzling parrots, tracked down antbird after antbird, and shared river space with Giant Otters and Tapirs alike. That's on top of seeing such mouth-watering specials as Pompadour Cotinga, Kawall's Amazon, Red-billed Pied Tanager, Zigzag Heron, Tapajos Hermit and Redfan Parrot! Needless to say, our extension to Iguazú was also a perfect complement to such action-packed and wild experiences. Not only were the falls a gargantuan highlight in themselves, we were able to enjoy them at leisure and in conjunction with some wonderful birding in the Atlantic Rainforest...

Tour summary

Beginning with the Argentine segment of our adventures, we were afforded the opportunity to get back into foreign birding under pretty easy conditions and in often spectacular surroundings to boot. Indeed, boardwalks over thunderous cascades of water with **Black-fronted Piping-guans** visible nearby, train rides through the forest and stakeouts at hummingbird feeders were maybe a little too easy. We weren't complaining though and to be honest, we did work a little harder than that from time to time. We walked a recently rain-sodden?? road (the 101) through Iguazú National Park, strolled the length of the Macuco Trail nearby (partly during a rain shower) and even completed the entire overgrown Urugua-i loop trail, further to the south. A thoroghly enjoyable mix and a productive one at that for the ground that we covered gave us a great selection of Atlantic Forest endemics and spectacular birds.

Chief among these sighted in Iguazú National Park were Spot-backed Antshrike, Surucua and



Black-throated Trogons, Ochre-collared Piculet, Eared Pygmy Tyrant, Variable Antshrike, White-eyed Foliage-gleaner, White-backed Fire-eye, Chestnut-headed Tanager, Green-winged Saltator, Blue and White-bearded Manakins, Green-headed Tanager, Slaty-breasted Wood Rail, Robust Woodpecker, Chestnut-bellied Euphonia, Blue-naped Chlorophonia, Green-billed Toucan, Red-rumped Cacique, Black-goggled Tanager, Black-throated Grosbeak, Spot-billed Toucanet, Streak-capped Antwren, Rusty-margined Guan, Southern Antpipit, Rufous-thighed Kite, Grey-hooded Flycatcher and Sepia-capped Flycatcher, while the most outstanding experiences belong to the time we spent finding and watching a Short-tailed Antthrush through the scope and our encounter with a 'super flock' that we attracted with the call of a Tawny-crowned Pygmy Tyrant, near to one of the train platforms! We can't however, forget the non-avian experiences we had in the park. Traversing both the Devil's Throat and Upper Trail boardwalks, we were treated to some of the most awe-inspiring views on the planet. From thunderous chasms to a seemingly endless curtain of cascades, the falls stole our attention for two full afternoons on those first two days and while the word "Spectacular" doesn't cut it as a description, suffice to say that nobody complained about a break from birding to admire the falls.

Away from the park, at Urugua-i Provincial Park, best birds included Blackish-blue Seedeater, Drabbreasted Bamboo Tyrant, Ochre-faced Tody-Flycatcher, White-throated Spadebill, Large-headed Flatbill, Rufous-capped and Grey-bellied Spinetails, Bertoni's and Dusky-tailed Antbirds, Rufous Gnateater and White-rimmed Warbler, among other goodies and a break from the marauding South American Coatis and tourists at the Iguazú visitors' center. The hummingbird garden in Puerto Iguazú didn't disappoint either, as all of our target species showed up, including Planalto Hermit, Swallow-tailed Hummingbird, Black Jacobin, Black-throated Mango, Glittering-bellied Emerald, Violet-capped Woodnymph, Gilded Sapphire and Versicolored Emerald, even though some of us seemed focused solely on the Mangos!

Saying goodbye to the Iguazú area, where a final bit of birding near Puerto Iguazú gave us our only **Brazilian Teal** of the trip (and possibly Argentina's first **Neotropical Palm Swift**), we began our longish journey into the heart of Brazil. First an overland border crossing - where pigeons provided great amounts of entertainment - then two flights and a three-hour drive to our lodge in the Pantanal, where we bumped into our first **Crab-eating Foxes** and a **Southern Tamandua** (the former alerting us to the presence of the latter) while driving in. The Pantanal had already started to produce the goods!



And this it did for the rest of our six-night stay, providing us encounter after encounter with wondrous scenes, iconic birds and some great mammals.

Famous mostly for being a large wetland, I think it came as a surprise to some that much of our time was to be spent in dry woodland. Indeed, we woke up on our first morning to find ourselves surrounded by trees! It is a fact, however, that several of the great birds, and some of the best birding in the Pantanal, are to be found in the wooded areas scattered throughout much of the area. Birding that first morning, and on several other occasions, in woodland during our time in the Pantanal, this soon became apparent though, and we ended up with a delicious list that included White-wedged Piculet, Golden-green Woodpecker, Pale-crested Woodpecker, Cream-colored, Woodpecker, Helmeted Manakin, Undulated Tinamou (walking circles around us!), Chaco Chachalaca, Chestnut-bellied Guan, Bare-faced Curassow, Great Potoo (on a day-roost), Amazonian Motmot, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, the cartoonish Toco Toucan, incomparable (even for a macaw) Hyacinth Macaw, Golden-collared Macaw, Nanday Parakeet, Blue-crowned Parakeet, Grey-crested Cacholote, Great Rufous Woodcreeper, Red-billed Scythebill (one of my personal favorites), Planalto Slaty Antshrike, Large-billed and Black-bellied Antwrens, Mato Grosso Antbird, Stripe-necked Tody-Tyrant, White-eyed Attila and the gaudier-than-now Orange-backed Troupial!

Added to this, we were able to see many of these birds up-close, at the various bird feeders that we encountered along the way. **Grey-necked Wood Rails**, countless cardinals, **Bare-faced Currassows** and **Orange-backed Troupials** were all within a few feet of our camera lenses!


Of course, we did spend a much greater deal of time exploring the vast wet and open areas that make the Pantanal what it is. Doing so mostly from boats and along stretches of the famous *Transpantaneira*, we spent several an hour admiring scores of herons, storks, kingfishers, ibises, ducks, Southern Screamers, greater Rheas, Snail Kites, Limpkins, and Roseate Spoonbills, alongside less well-known denizens of the area - spinetails of several description, Least Bittern, Crane and Savanna Hawks, Black-backed Water Tyrant, White-headed Marsh Tyrant, Rusty-collared Seedeater, Buff-breasted and Fawn-breasted Wrens, Black-capped Donacobius, Scarlet-headed Blackbird, Pale-legged Hornero, Sungrebe and the truly bizarre Red-legged Seriema. Not to be outdone, nocturnal species like Nacunda Nighthawk, Band-tailed Nighthawk and Spot-tailed Nightjar all put in appearances whilst Giant Anteater, herds of Capybara, Black-and-gold Howler Monkeys and a



Yellow Armadillo represented the mammals well.

One mammal that deserves special mention, of course, is the **Jaguar**. Prepared to dedicate most of our time in the Porto Jofre area to searching the riverbanks for this magnificent cat, we were very pleased to find one not long into our first morning boat trip. Watched for ages as it slept under a tree on the edge of the Tres Irmaos River, several of us thought the trip was already made. The fact that some of us returned to search for more **Jaguars** the next morning, whilst others went birding, was testament to the success in itself. All in all it amounted to two very special sightings in the end and the proverbial cherry on top to our visit to the Pantanal.

On the other side of Cuiabá, the Chapada dos Guimarães area hosted our last few days in the southern part of Mato Grosso. Taking several short trips to areas scattered around the town and the national park of the same name, we sampled several types of *Cerrado* and even some forest. In the *Cerrado*, we picked up several new bird species, the likes of which included **Rufous-winged Antshrike**, **Rusty-backed Antwren**, **Collared Crescentchest**, **Suiriri** and **Chapada Flycatchers**, **Curl-crested Jay**, **White-rumped Tanager**, **White-lined Tanager**, **Shrike-like Tanager**, **Burnished-buff Tanager**, **Wedge-tailed Grass Finch**, **Black-throated Saltator**, **White-eared** and **Caatinga Puffbirds**, **Horned Sungem** (perched males!), **Scaled Pigeon**, **Blue-winged** and **Red-shouldered Macaws**, **Pale-breasted Spinetail**, **Burrowing Owl** and **Small-billed Tinamou!** Productive birding along forest roads, by complement added such delights as **Brown Jacamar** and both **Fiery-capped** and **Band-tailed Manakin!**



Great sightings, of course, weren't restricted to distant and seldom-visited sites within the area. Quite the contrary, as some of our best sightings came from busy tourist areas and the grounds right around our lodge. In the latter, the undoubted highlight was a **Maned Wolf** that left-us spell-bound for a few magical minutes - the longest period that our group had ever been silent! Also in the grounds, we enjoyed unbeatable views of a **Striped Owl**, **Ash-throated Crake**, **Little Nightjar** and a nesting **Narrow-billed Woodcreeper**. At the Centro Geodesico Viewpoint, we also enjoyed unbeatable views of **Blue Finch**, whilst sightings at Bridal Veil Falls included wonderful fly-bys from **Red-and-green Macaws**, **Biscutate Swift** and hunting **Cliff Flycatchers**.

For the final instalment of our South American adventure, we headed further north again, to the southern edge of the Amazon Rainforest. Based there at Cristalino, we were excited not only at the prospect of birding the area, but also at the privilege of being able to unpack our bags for five nights! Part of one of the largest tracts of contiguous Amazon rainforest that remains, Cristalino harbours healthy populations of an incredible number special birds and animals, both resident and migratory. We had six days to explore the area and to search for as many of these as possible so we made use of several trails, both towers and all available waterways, by day and by night, to maximise our haul and our experience.

Boat trips were especially productive for us and our excursions up and down both the Cristalino and Teles Pires Rivers provided us with numerous great sightings, the best of which were of Razor-billed Curassow, Agami Heron (on our first boat ride!), Zigzag Heron (mere feet away from our heads!), Ornate Hawk-Eagle, several Sunbitterns, several Paradise Jacamars, Brown-banded Puffbird, Ringed Woodpecker, Red-throated Caracara, Spix's Guan, hunting Bat Falcon, numerous Blue-and-yellow Macaws, Santarem and Golden-winged Parakeets on the shore, Red-fan Parrot, Speckled Spinetail, Long-billed Woodcreeper, displaying Glossy Antshrikes, Amazonian Streaked Antwren, Band-tailed Antbird, nest-building Spotted Tody-Flycatchers, Spangled Cotinga, several Bare-necked Fruitcrows, male and female Amazonian Umbrellabirds, White-banded and Black-collared Swallows, Yellow-bellied Dacnis and that star of Amazonian watercourses, Hoatzin! By the river's edge, right near the lodge jetty, we even bumped into a plethora of hummingbirds that included an obliging Tapajos Hermit, watched the resident family Giant Otters on several occasions and saw our first Tapir - all within moments of our arrival!



The towers cannot go unmentioned, of course, and although some hot weather reduced activity during several of our visits, we still came away with great birds like Pompadour Cotinga, White-browed Hawk, Black-bellied Cuckoo, Pied Puffbird, Black-girdled Barbet, Curl-crested Aracari, White-throated Toucan (common and widespread but always a hit, especially when in full song at eyelevel!), Red-stained Woodpecker, Scaly-breasted and Red-necked Woodpeckers, Crimson-bellied Parakeet, White-bellied Parrot, Kawall's Amazon, White-browed Purpletuft, Olive Oropendola, Red-billed Pied Tanager, White-winged Shrike-Tanager, Short-billed and Purple Honeycreepers, Yellow-shouldered and Slate-colored Grosbeaks, Turquoise Tanager, Paradise Tanager, Bayheaded Tanager, Tooth-billed Wren and Sclater's Antwren. We even had the pleasure of watching a Southern Tamandua clambering about the treetops near to Tower 2 on of our visits.

Last but not least, walking trails and other floor-bound excursions completed our coverage of Cristalino's wonderful habitats, on top of providing us with dozens of species that we encountered nowhere else. Foremost among these were species of antibird and ovenbird, though owls and other nocturnal birds, manakins and tyrant flycatchers were all very well-represented. And while a **Crested Owl** roosting near the restaurant, and **Blackish Nightjars** roosting on rooves nearby might not qualify as birds we worked hard for, walks below the canopy did present a birding challenge twith which rainforests are so synonymous. Active understory flocks needed careful attention and patience for us to eke out views of **White-eyed Antwren**, **Uniform** and **Spix's Woodcreepers**, **Short-tailed** and **Helmeted Pygmy Tyrants**, **Chestnut-backed Antshrike** and **Amazonian Antshrikes**, and **Rosebreasted Chat**, while nocturnal forays were a little kinder with **Tawny-bellied Screech Owl** and **Ocellated Poorwill** giving up easily and putting on a great show. Lone birds too gave us a good run for our money but rewards in the form of great views of **Banded Antbird**, **Flame-crested Manakin**, **White-browed Antbird**, **Blue-necked Jacamar** and **Amazonian Pygmy Owl** were well worth the effort.

I - Introduced (H) - Heard Only

Tinamous Tinamidae

(H) Cinereous Tinamou Crypturellus cinereus

We heard this species at Cristalino.

(H) Little Tinamou Crypturellus soui

Also heard at Cristalino.

(H) Brown Tinamou Crypturellus obsoletus

Heard only, at Cristalino.

Undulated Tinamou Crypturellus undulatus

Unforgettable views of one that walked circles around us at Piuval!

(H) Brazilian Tinamou Crypturellus strigulosus

Heard on a couple of occasions at Cristalino.

(H) Variegated Tinamou Crypturellus variegatus

Heard at Cristalino.

Small-billed Tinamou Crypturellus parvirostris

Two seen crossing the Geladeira road, Chapada dos Guimarães.

(H) Tataupa Tinamou Crypturellus tataupa

Heard along the Agua Fria road, on our final mrning in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

(H) Red-winged Tinamou Rhynchotus rufescens

Heard throughout the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Rheas Rheidae

Greater Rhea Rhea americana

Several groups seen, all along the *Transpantaneira*.

Screamers Anhimidae

Southern Screamer Chauna torquata

Common along the southern sections of the *Transpantaneira*.

Ducks, Geese, Swans Anatidae

White-faced Whistling Duck Dendrocygna viduata

First seen during our drive to Porto Jofre.

Black-bellied Whistling Duck Dendrocygna autumnalis

Also first seen during our drive to Porto Jofre.

Muscovy Duck Cairina moschata

Encountered on several occasions during our time in the Pantanal, and daily in the Cristalino area.

Amazonetta brasiliensis **Brazilian Teal**

Just the one sighting – on our final morning in Argentina.

Chachalacas, Curassows & Guans Cracidae

Chaco Chachalaca

Ortalis canicollis

Common in the Pantanal.

Rusty-margined Guan

Penelope supercilliaris

A couple of sightings on our first morning in Argentina, followed by more at Uurgua-i Provincial Park.

Spix's Guan

Penelope jacquacu

Just the one sighting at Cristalino, from the floating dock, early one morning. **Chestnut-bellied Guan** Penelope ochrogaster

Great views of a pair at Pousada Rio Claro.

Blue-throated Piping Guan

Pipile cumanensis

Good numbers seen in the Pantanal.

Red-throated Piping Guan

Several seen well in the Cristalino area, a few in the Pantanal.

Black-fronted Piping Guan

Pipile cujubi

Pipile cujubi

First seen from the boardwalk to the Devil's Throat.

Razor-billed Curassow

Mitu tuberosum

Great views of a few, along the edge of the Cristalino River.

Bare-faced Curassow

Crax fasciolata

Habituated pairs of this fabulous bird were seen at Pousada Curicaca and Cristalino. Other, wilder, individuals were seen throughout the Pantanal and along the Cristalino River.

Grebes Podicipedidae

Least Grebe

Tachybaptus dominicus

Seen at the small wetland that we visited on our final morning in Argentina. Pied-billed Grebe

Podilymbus podiceps

Also seen at the above-mentioned site.

Storks Ciconiidae

Wood Stork

Mycteria americana

Abundant in the Pantanal.

Jabiru

Jabiru mycteria

Another common denizen of the Pantanal.

Ibises, Spoonbills Threskiornithidae

Plumbeous Ibis

Theristicus caerulescens

Seen almost daily in the Pantanal.

Buff-necked Ibis

Theristicus caudatus

Also seen frequently in the Pantanal.

Green Ibis

Mesembrinibis cayennensis

Seen almost daily in the Pantanal and the Cristalino area.

Bare-faced Ibis

Phimosus infuscatus

A handful of sightings in the Pantanal.

Roseate Spoonbill

Platalea ajaja

Seen throughout the Pantanal, on all but one of our full days there.

Herons, Bitterns Ardeidae

Rufescent Tiger Heron Tigrisoma lineatum

Big numbers of these throughout the Pantanal. A handful in the Cristalino area.

Agami Heron Agamia agami

Both adults and young birds seen at Cristalino.

Boat-billed Heron *Cochlearius cochlearius*Several great sightings in the Pantanal, followed by a couple of others at Cristalino.

Zigzag Heron Zebrilus undulatus

Unbeatable views of one at Cristalino!

Least Bittern Ixobrychus exilis

A couple of us managed to grab a view of one of these in the Pantanal, just as we stepped of the bus to

look for Cinereous-breasted Spinetail, near Porto Jofre.

Black-crowned Night Heron Nycticorax nycticorax

A handful seen in total, mostly in the Pantanal.

Striated Heron Butorides striata

Common in the Pantanal and regularly encountered along the Cristalino River.

Western Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis
Common in the Pantanal and other agricultural areas outside the region.

Cocoi Heron Ardea cocoi

Commonly encountered in the Pantanal.

Great Egret Ardea alba

Very common in the Pantanal.

Capped Heron Pilherodius pileatus

Encountered on several occasions in the Pantanal and at Cristalino.

Whistling Heron

Syrigma sibilatrix

Seen almost daily during our time in the Pantanal.

Little Blue Heron Egretta caerulea

Small numbers seen throughout the Pantanal.

Snowy Egret Egretta thula

Another commonly encountered Pantanal species.

Cormorants, Shags Phalacrocoracidae

Neotropic Cormorant Phalacrocorax brasilianus

Commonly recorded in the Pantanal.

Anhingas, Darters Anhingidae

Anhinga Anhinga anhinga

Encountered almost daily.

New World Vultures Cathartidae

Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura

Small numbers of this widespread vulture were observed throughout our time in Argentina and in the

Pantanal.

Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture Cathartes burrovianus

Ubiquitous in the Pantanal.

Greater Yellow-headed Vulture Cathartes melambrotus

Recorded daily in the Cristalino area.

Black Vulture

Coragyps atratus

Seen almost daily.

King Vulture

Sarcoramphus papa

Several birds seen in flight (on all three trip segments), one seen perched from Tower 2 at Cristalino.

Ospreys Pandionidae

Western Osprey

Pandion haliaetus

A handful seen in the Pantanal, including a couple seen along the Cuiabá River, and another at Cristalino.

Kites, Hawks & Eagles Accipitridae

Pearl Kite

Gampsonyx swainsonii

One of several trip birds that we picked up on our way back to Alta Floresta from Cristalino.

Grey-headed Kite

Leptodon cayanensis

One seen on our first morning in Argentina.

Hook-billed Kite

Chondrohierax uncinatus

One surprise sighting in the Pantanal, followed by several others in the Cristalino area.

Swallow-tailed Kite

Elanoides forficatus

Several sightings during the course of the entire trip, with peak numbers at Cristalino.

Ornate Hawk-Eagle

Spizaetus ornatus

An unforgettable sighting during our final boat ride at Cristalino!

Double-toothed Kite

Harpagus bidentatus

A handful seen during our time at Cristalino, mostly from the towers.

Rufous-thighed Kite

Harpagus diodon

One flying over the road on our first morning in Iguazú National Park.

Mississippi Kite

Ictinia mississippiensis

Two seen in the Pantanal, the first of which was seen during our walk at Pousada Curicaca.

Plumbeous Kite

Ictinia plumbea

Seen almost daily, throughout the trip.

Black-collared Hawk

Busarellus nigricollis

Small numbers seen daily in the Pantanal.

Snail Kite

Rostrhamus sociabilis

Pleasantly abundant in parts of the Pantanal.

Crane Hawk

Geranospiza caerulescens

This long-legged hawk was seen well on several occasions in the Pantanal and at Cristalino.

Savanna Hawk

Buteogallus meridionalis

This attractive hawk was also almost daily in the Pantanal.

Great Black Hawk

Buteogallus urubitinga

Fairly frequently encountered throughout the Pantanal, and on several occasions along the Cristalino River.

Roadside Hawk

Rupornis magnirostris

This familiar Neotropical raptor was first seen in Argentina.

White-browed Hawk

Leucopternis kuhli

One seen from Tower 2, Cristalino.

Grey-lined Hawk

Buteo nitidus

First seen during our drive from Alta Floresta to the Teles Pires River.

Seriemas Cariamidae

Red-legged Seriema

Cariama cristata

Some really close encounters in the Pantanal!

Sunbittern Eurypygidae

Sunbittern

Eurypyga helias

This great bird, also monotypic, was a pleasantly regular sight in the Pantanal and along the Cristalino River.

Finfoots Heliornithidae

Sungrebe

Heliornis fulica

Some great views on the Rio Claro and Cristalino River.

Rails, Crakes & Coots Rallidae

(H) Rufous-sided Crake

Laterallus melanophaius

Heard at the large lake at Piuval.

Grev-necked Wood Rail

Aramides cajanea

Daily sightings in the Pantanal.

Slaty-breasted Wood Rail

Aramides saracura

Great views of one beside the road in Iguazú National Park.

Ash-throated Crake

Porzana albicollis

Seen on the edge of the Pousada do Parque grounds.

Purple Gallinule

Porphyrio martinicus

One sighting, near Pousada Curicaca.

Common Gallinule

Gallinula galeata

Seen on our final morning in Argentina.

Limpkin Aramidae

Limpkin

Aramus guarauna

Very common in the Pantanal.

Plovers Charadriidae

Southern Lapwing

Vanellus chilensis

A very common bird throughout the first two segmnets of the trip.

Collared Plover

Charadrius collaris

Several sightings from both the Cuiabá and Teles Pires Rivers.

Pied Plover

Hoploxypterus cayanus

Several of these striking waders were also seen on the bigger sandbars in the Cuiabá River.

Jacanas Jacanidae

Wattled Jacana

Jacana jacana

Wonderfully common in the Pantanal.

Sandpipers, Snipes Scolopacidae

Solitary Sandpiper

Tringa solitaria

First seen on the shores of the Cuiabá River.

Spotted Sandpiper

Actitius macularius

Seen at a handful of scattered sites, including the Cuiabá River.

White-rumped Sandpiper

Calidris fuscicollis

Seen on a few occasions on the Cuiabá River.

Gulls, Terns & Skimmers Laridae

Black Skimmer

Rynchops niger

Small groups and individuals seen daily during our time cruising along the Cuiabá River and some of its tributaries.

Yellow-billed Tern

Sternula superciliaris

This elegant little tern was also commonly seen in the same areas as the above species.

Large-billed Tern

Phaetusa simplex

As with the above species.

Pigeons, Doves Columbidae

Common Pigeon

Columba livia

Noted on a couple of days.

Scaled Pigeon

Patagioenas speciosa

A few sightings in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Picazuro Pigeon

Patagioenas picazuro

Particularly common in the Pantanal.

Pale-vented Pigeon

Patagioenas cayennensis

Commonly seen in Iguazú National Park and in the Pantanal.

Plumbeous Pigeon

Patagioenas plumbea

Just a couple spotted during our time at Cristalino.

Ruddy Pigeon

Patagioenas subvinacea

First seen during our boat transfer to Cristalino.

Eared Dove

Zenaida auriculata

Several sightings in both Argentina and in the Pantanal.

Scaled Dove

Scardafella squammata

This ornate little dove was seen well at several locations in the Pantanal. **Ruddy Ground Dove**Columbina talpacoti

Common in the Pantanal.

Picui Ground Dove

Columbina picui

A few seen near the entrance to the Transpantaneira.

Blue Ground Dove

. Claravis pretiosa

Several seen, mostly in flight, in well-wooded areas of the Pantanal.

Long-tailed Ground Dove

Uropelia campestris

Another species first seen at the Mato Grosso Hotel.

White-tipped Dove

Leptotila verreauxi

Encountered daily in good numbers in the Pantanal, following our first sightings in Argentina.

Hoatzin Opisthocomidae

Hoatzin

Opisthocomus hoazin

A few seen along the upper reaches of the Cristalino River.

Cuckoos Cuculidae

Guira Cuckoo

Guira guira

Gangs of these curious, social cuckoos were frequently observed in the Pantanal.

Greater Ani

Crotophaga major

Not uncommon during our time in the Pantanal, where large flocks were seen mostly along rivers.

Smooth-billed Ani

Crotophaga ani

One of the most regularly encountered birds of our tour, highest numbers seen in the Pantanal.

Striped Cuckoo

Tapera naevia

First seen by some of us during a boat ride along the Tres Irmãos River, while others caught up at Pinval.

(H) Pheasant Cuckoo

Dromococcyx phasianellus

We heard one of these below the Geodésico viewpoint.

(H) Pavonine Cuckoo

Dromococcyx pavoninus

Unfortunately, also only heard – in Argentina and in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Little Cuckoo

Coccycua minuta

Good looks at one along the edge of the Cuiabá River, another sighted at Cristalino.

Squirrel Cuckoo

Piaya cayana

Scattered sightings at all three major locations visited.

Black-bellied Cuckoo

Piaya melanogaster

Great views of this species from Tower 2, at Cristalino.

Dark-billed Cuckoo

Coccyzus melacoryphus

Also seen well from Tower 2, Cristalino.

Owls Strigidae

Tropical Screech Owl

Megascops choliba

'Performed' very nicely, on two occasions, on our third night at Orquídeas Palace Hotel. Others seen on a day roost at Pousada do Parque.

Tawny-bellied Screech Owl

Megascops watsonii

Prolonged views of a calling bird at Cristalino.

Great Horned Owl

Bubo virginianus

One, on a day roost, in a patch of mango trees beside the *Transpantaneira*. **Crested Owl**

Mlophostrix cristata

One of the first birds we saw after arriving at Cristalino Lodge.

Amazonian Pygmy Owl

Glaucidium hardyi

After a little effort, seen well along the Taboca Trail, Cristalino.

Ferruginous Pygmy Owl

Glaucidium brasilianum

Picked up by a couple of people at Pousada Curicaca.

Burrowing Owl

Athene cunicularia

Great views of several in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Striped Owl

Pseudoscops clamator

An unexpected bonus in the form of a calling adult near Pousada do Parque.

Potoos Nyctibiidae

Great Potoo

Nyctibius grandis

First seen on a day-roost at Pousada Curicaca.

Common Potoo

Nyctibius griseus

Seen on our night drive at Pousada Piuval.

Nightjars Caprimulgidae

Nacunda Nighthawk

Podager nacunda

A few seen flying over the Cuiabá River, more seen returning to roost over the Pousada Piuval

grounds.

Common Nighthawk

Chordeiles minor

Several seen over the Cristalino River and from the towers.

Short-tailed Nighthawk

Leurocalis semitorquatus

On a day-roost in the Iguazú area, and in flight over the Cristalino River.

Band-tailed Nighthawk

Nyctiprogne leucopyga

Seen over the Cuiabá and Claro Rivers.

Blackish Nightjar

Caprimulgus nigrescens

Great views of several around (and on!) our accommodation at Cristalino.

Pauraque Nyctidromus albicollis

The most commonly encountered nightjar, throughout the tour.

Little Nightjar Setopagis parvula

Great close-ups of one near the Pousada do Parque restaurant.

Spot-tailed Nightjar

Hydropsalis maulicaudus

Also seen very well and up-close, during our night drive at Piuval.

Ladder-tailed Nightjar

Hydropsalis climacocerca

Several seen on a small, vegetated sandbar/island in the Teles Pires River.

(H) Scissor-tailed Nightjar

Hydropsalis torquata

Heard on several occasions from the Pousada do Parque restaurant area.

Ocellated Poorwill

Nyctiphrynus ocellatus

Great views of one, just moments before we found ourselves looking at the Tawny-bellied Screech Owl, at Cristaino.

(H) Rufous Nightjar

Antrostomus rufus

Heard near the Pousada do Parque restaurant.

Swifts Apodidae

Great Dusky Swift

Cypseloides senex

Seen throughout the Iguazú Falls area and again in Chapada dos Guimarães.

White-collared Swift

Streptoprocne zonaris

A few seen in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Biscutate Swift

Streptoprocne biscutata

Fantastic close-ups at Bridal Veil Falls, Chapada dos Guimarães.

Grey-rumped Swift

Chaetura cinereiventris

Seen amost daily in the Cristalino area – mostly over the river near the lodge.

Sick's Swift

Chaetura meridionalis

A few seen above a gas station in Iguazú.

Short-tailed Swift

Chaetura brachvura

A distinctive swift, seen in the Cristalino area on a few occasions.

Neotropical (Fork-tailed) Palm Swift

Tachornis squamata

Seen together with Sick's Swift on our final morning in Argentina – possibly the first record.

Hummingbirds Trochilidae

Long-tailed Hermit

Phaethornis superciliosus

Only seen by those who paid a second visit to the small drinking pool at Cristalino.

Planalto Hermit

Phaethornis pretrei

Great views of one at the feeders in Puerto Iguazú, followed by more in the Pousada do Parque grounds.

Tapajos Hermit

Phaethornis aethopygus

Also seen very well, near the floating dock at Cristalino.

Grey-breasted Sabrewing

Campylopterus largipennis

Several at the same spot as the above species.

Swallow-tailed Hummingbird

Eupetomena macroura

First seen at the feeders in Puerto Iguazú. Several more seen at Pousada do Parque.

Black Jacobin Florisuga fusca

At the feeders in Puerto Iguazú.

White-vented VioletearSeveral good views along the Agua Fria road, Chapada dos Guimarães.

Black-throated mango Anthracothorax nigricollis

Common at the feeders in Puerto Iguazú.

Purple-crowned PlovercrestStephanoxis loddigesii

One of us saw this species at Urugua-i Provincial Park.

Glittering-bellied Emerald Chlorostilbon lucidus

Several at the feeders in Puerto Iguazú and in the grounds of Pousada do Parque.

Fork-tailed Woodnymph Thalurania furcata

The most common species at Pousada do Parque during our stay.

Violet-capped Woodnymph Thalurania glaucopis

Seen at most sites visited in Argentina, including the hummingbird garden in Puerto Iguazú.

Gilded Sapphire Hylocharis chrysura

At the feeders in Puerto Iguazú.

Versicolored EmeraldAmazilia versicolor

At the feeders in Puerto Iguazú.

Glittering-throated Emerald Amazilia fimbriata
A few in the grounds of both Pousada Rio Claro and Pousada do Parque.
Black-eared Fairy Heliothryx auritus

A few sightings at Cristalino, mostly from the towers.

Horned SungemHeliactin bilophus

Fantastic views of perched males during our first morning on the Agua Fria road.

Long-billed Starthroat

Heliomaster longirostris

First seen, though not by all, in the grounds of Pousada do Parque. Several more seen at Cristalino.

Amethyst Woodstar Calliphlox amethystina

A few along the Geladeira road.

Trogons Trogonidae

Black-tailed Trogon melanurus

A pair seen from Tower 1, Cristalino.

(H) Green-backed Trogon Trogon viridis

Heard at Cristalino.

Amazonian Trogon Trogon ramonianus

From both towers at Cristalino.

Blue-crowned Trogon Trogon curucui

A handful of encounters, shared between the Pantanal and the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Surucua Trogon Trogon surrucura

One of the first birds seen on the tour – along the 101, in Iguazú National Park.

Black-throated Trogon Trogon rufus

Seen just a little further down the road from the above species.

Kingfishers Alcedinidae

Chloroceryle aenea American Pygmy Kingfisher

Several great views in the Pantanal.

Green-and-rufous Kingfisher Chloroceryle inda A handful of sightings, spread between the Pantanal and Cristalino.

Green Kingfisher Chlorocervle americana

Also seen on a handful of occasions in the Pantanal and at Cristalino.

Amazon Kingfisher Chloroceryle amazona

The most common kingfisher on the tour.

Ringed Kingfisher Megaceryle torquata

Pleasantly common throughout the tour.

Motmots Momotidae

Amazonian Motmot Momotus momota

First sighted in woodland at Pousada Curicaca.

(H) Rufous-capped Motmot Baryphthengus ruficapillus

Heard in Iguazú National Park.

<u>Jacamars Galbulidae</u>

Brachygalba lugubris **Brown Jacamar**

One small groups seen along the 'Manakin Road', Chapada dos Guimarães. **Blue-necked Jacamar** Galbula cyanicollis

Two encounters at Cristalino, the second of which (along Manakin Trail) provided us all with great looks.

Rufous-tailed Jacamar Galbula ruficauda

Encountered regularly in the Pantanal and on a few occasions at Cristalino. **Bronzy Jacamar** Galbula leucogastra

Great looks at a pair, along the Manakin Trail at Cristalino.

Paradise Jacamar Galbula dea

Numerous sightings at Cristalino.

Puffbirds Bucconidae

Notharcus hyperrhynchus White-necked Puffbird

Seen at a distance from Tower 2.

Brown-banded Puffbird Notharcus ordii

A pair, perched near the top of Tower 2.

Pied Puffbird Nystalus tectus

One sighting, from Tower 1, Cristalino.

White-eared Puffbird Nystalus chacuru

A few good sightings in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Caatinga Puffbird Nystalus maculatus

Great views, along the Geladeira road.

Black-fronted Nunbird Monasa nigrifrons

Regular sightings in the Pantanal and at Cristalino.

White-fronted Nunbird Monasa morphoeus

A few seen from both towers at Cristalino.

Swallow-wing [ed Puffbird] Chelidoptera tenebrosa

Common along the Cristalino River.

New World Barbets Capitonidae

Black-girdled Barbet

Capito dayi

A few good sightings from Tower 1, Cristalino.

Toucans Ramphastidae

Lettered Aracari Pteroglossus inscriptus

Several seen from both towers at Cristalino.

Red-necked Aracari Pteroglossus bitorquatus

One distant sighting from Tower 1, Cristalino.

Chestnut-eared Aracari Pteroglossus castanotis

Not uncommon during our time in Argentina and in the Pantanal.

Curl-crested Aracari Pteroglossus beauharnaessii

Several encounters with these fantastic little toucans at Cristalino.

Spot-billed Toucanet Selenidera maculirostris

Great close-ups at Orquídeas Palace Hotel and along the Macuco Trail.

Green-billed Toucan

Ramphastos dicolorus

Great views of a calling bird, near the Macuco Trail, Iguazú National Park.

Channel-billed Toucan Ramphastos vitellinus

First seen in Chapada dos Guimarães. Regular at Cristalino. **Toco Toucan**Ramphastos toco

Seen almost daily before we reached Cristalino.

White-throated ToucanRamphastos tucanus

A regular sight at Cristalino.

Woodpeckers Picidae

Bar-breasted Piculet Picumnus aurifrons

A couple of sightings at Cristalino.

Ochre-collared Piculet Picumnus temminckii

Superb close-ups along the 101, Iguazú National Park.

White-wedged Piculet Picumnus albosquamatus

Several encounters in the Pantanal.

White Woodpecker Melanerpes candidus

One sighting at Piuval.

Yellow-tufted Woodpecker Melanerpes cruentatus

A handful of sightings in the Chapada dos Guimarães area. Also seen at Cristalino.

Yellow-fronted Woodpecker *Melanerpes flavifrons*

Sightings throughout our time in Argentina.

Little WoodpeckerVeniliornis passerinus

Seen a couple of times in the Pantanal and in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

White-spotted Woodpecker Veniliornis affinis

Seen just before our first Ochre-collared Piculet, along the 101 in Iguazú National Park.

Red-stained WoodpeckerVeniliornis affinis

A pair, seen from a boat, just upriver from Cristalino.

Yellow-throated Woodpecker Piculus flavigula

Seen by a few of us, on an extra visit to Tower 1, Cristalino.

Golden-green Woodpecker Piculus chrysochloros

One pair, seen on the edge of the Tres Irmãos River.

Green-barred Woodpecker

Colaptes melanochloros

Two sightings – one along the *Transpantaneira* near Piuval, the other at Piuval itself.

Campo Flicker

Colaptes campestris

Numerous sightings in the Pantanal. Recorded by some in Argentina.

Scaly-breasted Woodpecker

Celeus grammicus

One sighting at Cristalino.

Pale-crested Woodpecker

Celeus lugubris

First sighted at Pousada Curicaca.

Blond-crested Woodpecker

Celeus flavescens

Great looks, at Orquídeas Palace Hotel, Argentina.

Cream-colored Woodpecker

Celeus flavus

One of several great birds seen on our short walk at the Mato Grosso Hotel.

Ringed Woodpecker

Celeus torquatus

Two good sightings at Cristalino – one from the river, another from Tower 2. **Lineated Woodpecker**Campephilus lineatus

Just the one sighting in the Pantanal.

Red-necked Woodpecker

Campephilus rubricollis

First seen from Tower 1, Cristalino.

Robust Woodpecker

Campephilus robustus

A pair on the Macuco Trail, Iguazú National Park.

Crimson-crested Woodpecker

Campephilus melanoleucos

A single sighting at Cristalino.

Caracaras, Falcons Falconidae

Black Caracara

Daptrius ater

Several encounters, mostly with the same family group, along the Cristalino River.

Red-throated Caracara

Ibycter americanus

Also seen along the Cristalino River.

Southern Crested Caracara

Caracara plancus

333. I say no more.

Yellow-headed Caracara

Milvago chimachima

A handful of sightings from Argentina and the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Laughing Falcon

Herpetotheres cachinnans

One adult, seen during our boat ride on the Rio Claro.

(H) Barred Forest Falcon

Micrastur ruficollis

One heard along the Urugua-i Trail, Argentina.

Cryptic Forest Falcon

Micrastur mintoni

Heard by all, seen by a lucky few, on the Manakin Trail at Cristalino.

American Kestrel

Falco sparverius

A few sightings, shared between the Iguazú area and the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Bat Falcon

Falco rufigularis

Along the Cristalino River.

Orange-breasted Falcon

Falco deiroleucus

One very distant individual seen from the Bridal Veil Falls viewpoint.

Parrots Psittacidae

Hyacinth Macaw

Anodorhynchus hyacinthinus

Thankfully still a common sight in the Pantanal, where we had encounters on a daily basis.

Blue-and-yellow Macaw

Ara ararauna

Another beautiful parrot, and another with which we enjoyed several encounters – at Cristalino.

Scarlet Macaw

Ara chloropterus

Also only seen at Cristalino.

Red-and-green Macaw

Ara chloropterus

Unforgettable views at Bridal Veil Falls. Further sightings at Cristalino.

Chestnut-fronted Macaw

Ara severus

Spotted first from Tower 1, Cristalino.

Blue-winged Macaw

Primolius maracana

A few, along the Geladeira road in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Golden (Yellow)-collared Macaw

Primolius auricollis

Great views at Pousada Curicaca.

Red-shouldered Macaw

Diopsittaca nobilis

Great views near Pousada do Parque and along the Geladeira road.

Nanday Parakeet

Nandayus nenday

Seen at close-range at the Pousada Rio Claro feeders.

Peach-fronted Parakeet

Eupsittula aurea

Commonly seen throughout the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Blue-crowned Parakeet

Thectocercus acuticaudatus

Eventually found in the mango trees at Pousada Piuval.

White-eyed Parakeet

Psittacara leucopthalmus

Almost daily after our first sighting in Argentina.

Maroon-bellied Parakeet

Pyrrhula frontalis

A couple of sightings in Iguazú National Park.

Crimson-bellied Parakeet

Pyrrhula perlata

Good looks from Tower 1 at Cristalino.

Santarem Parakeet

Pyrrhula amazonum

A sizeable flock seen drinking from the Cristalino River.

Monk Parakeet

Myiopsitta monachus

First recorded in Argentina, most common in the Pantanal.

Blue-winged Parotlet

Forpus xanthopterygius

First seen well near the Iguazú National Park visitors' center.

Dusky-billed Parotlet

Forpus modestus

Seen flying over the Cristalino Lodge, by just a few of us.

Yellow-chevroned Parakeet

Brotogeris chiriri

Plenty seen well in the Pantanal but first seen at Orquídeas Palace Hotel.

Golden-winged Parakeet

Brotogeris chrysoptera

Small groups seen on the edge of the Cristalino River and from both towers. White-bellied Parrot

Pionites leucogaster

From both towers at Cristalino.

(H) Orange-cheeked Parrot

Pyrilia barrabandi

Heard at Cristalino.

(H) Bald Parrot

Pyrilia aurantiocephela

Heard at Cristalino.

Blue-headed Parrot

Pionus menstruus

First seen in the Chapada dos Guimarães area, most common at Cristalino.

Scaly-headed Parrot

Pionus maximiliani

Sightings from both Iguazú National Park and the Pantanal.

Turquoise (Blue)-fronted Amazon

Amazona aestiva

Not an uncommon sight during our time in the Pantanal. First seen, however, at Orquídeas Palace Hotel.

Orange-winged Amazon

Amazona amazonica

Just the one sighting, at Pousada Curicaca.

Kawall's Amazon

Amazona kawalli

A couple of sightings at Cristalino, including one from Tower 1.

Mealy Amazon

Amazona farinosa

Also only recorded at Cristalino.

Red-fan Parrot

Deroptyus accipitrinus

One small group seen from the Cristalino River, just upriver from the lodge.

Ovenbirds Furnariidae

Pale-legged Hornero

Furnarius leucopus

A few individuals seen near larger rivers in the Pantanal.

Rufous Hornero

Furnarius rufus

A daily sighting until we reached Cristalino.

Araucaria Tit-Spinetail

Leptasthenura setaria

Eventually drawn out at a small patch of Araucaria between Urugua-i Provincial Park and Orquídeas

Palace Hotel.

Chotoy Spinetail

Schoeniophylax phryganophilus

Seen during our walk around the Mato Grosso Hotel grounds.

Rufous-capped Spinetail

Synallaxis ruficapilla

Seen only in Urugua-i Provincial Park.

Grey-bellied Spinetail

Synallaxis cinerascens

As with the above species.

Sooty-fronted Spinetail

Synallaxis frontalis

In woodland at Piuval.

Pale-breasted Spinetail

Synallaxis albescens

A few seen along the Agua Fria road, Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Cinereous-breasted Spinetail

Synallaxis hypospodia

Taped out of some roadside scrub, north of Porto Jofre.

White-lored Spinetail

Synallaxis albilora

Several at Pousada Curicaca and along the trail near the Mato Grosso Hotel.

Rusty-backed Spinetail

Cranioleuca vulpina

Encountered on the edge of all major rivers visited in the Pantanal.

Speckled Spinetail

Cranioleuca gutturata

Eventually seen in riverside vegetation at Cristalino.

Yellow-chinned Spinetail

Certhiaxis cinnamomeus

A few sightings in the Pantanal.

Rufous-fronted Thornbird

Phacellodomus rufifrons

A pair seen near their nest, along the *Transpantaneira*.

Greater Thornbird

Phacellodomus ruber

A few seen well in the Pantanal – at the Mato Grosso Hotel, for example.

Grey-crested Cacholote

Pseudoseisura unirufa

Several seen in the Pantanal following our first sighting at Pousada Rio Claro.

Point-tailed Palmcreeper

Berlepschia rikeri

Seen very well in a patch of *Mauritia* between Alta Floresta and the Teles Pires River.

Buff-browed Foliage-gleaner Syndactyla rufosuperciliata

Only sighted at Urugua-i Provincial Park.

Ochre-breasted Foliage-gleaner Philydor lichtensteini

Several seen in Argentina.

Buff-fronted Foliage-gleaner Philydor rufum

Nice close-ups along the 101, Iguazú National Park.

White-eyed Foliage-gleaner Automolus leucopthalmus

Several entertaining encounters in Iguazú National Park.

(H) Plain Xenops Xenops minutus

Heard at Cristalino.

Streaked XenopsXenops rutilans

Great looks at Cristalino.

(H) Plain-winged Woodcreeper Dendrocincla turdina

Heard along the Macuco Trail, Iguazú National Park.

Olivaceous Woodcreeper Sittasomus griseicapillus

Showed well on several occasions during our time in Argentina.

Wedge-billed Woodcreeper Glyphorhynchus spirurus

Brief but good looks at Cristalino.

Long-billed WoodcreeperNasica longirostris

Great views from the Cristalino River.

Uniform Woodcreeper *Hylexetastes uniformis*

A pair, seen well at Cristalino.

Strong-billed Woodcreeper *Xiphocolaptes promeropirhynchus*

Seen flying over the Cristalino River (and our heads).

Great Rufous Woodcreeper Xiphocolaptes major

A few great looks around Pousada Curicaca, for most.

Planalto Woodcreeper Dendrocolaptes platyrostris

Singles seen along the Macuco Trail and at Pousada Curicaca.

Straight-billed Woodcreeper Dendroplex picus

Another one seen only at Pousada Curicaca.

Striped Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus obsoletus

Only seen at Cristalino.

Lesser Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus fuscus

A couple on the Macuco Trail.

Spix's Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus spixii

One pair seen at Cristalino.

Buff-throated Woodcreeper Xiphorhynchus guttatus

Individuals at Pousada Curicaca and Pousada Piuval.

Narrow-billed Woodcreeper Lepidocolaptes angustirostris

First seen on fence posts at Piuval, common thereafter in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Rondonia Woodcreeper Lepidocolaptes fuscicapillus

Great close-ups from Tower 1 at Cristalino, for a few of us.

Red-billed ScythebillCampylorhamphus trochilirostris

Super views in woodland near Pousada Curicaca.

Antbirds Thamnophilidae

Spot-backed Antshrike Hypoedaleus guttatus

A calling adult seen through the scope on the first morning of the tour.

(H) Tufted Antshrike

Mackenziaena severa

Heard on several occasions in Iguazú National Park.

Great Antshrike *Taraba major*

First seen at Pousada Curicaca.

Glossy Antshrike Sakesphorus luctuosus

Great views at Cristalino – in riverside vegetation.

Barred Antshrike Thamnophilus doliatus

First seen near the train platform in Iguazú National Park.

Chestnut-backed Antshrike Thamnophilus palliatus

Pretty good looks at a pair at Cristalino.

Plain-winged Antshrike Thamnophilus schistaceus

Seen in a mixed-species feeding party at Cristalino.

Planalto Slaty Antshrike Thamnophilus pelzelni

A pair seen during our walk from Pousada Curicaca.

Amazonian Antshrike Thamnophilus amazonicus

Males and females seen in secondary habitat on the edge of the Teles Pires River.

Variable Antshrike Thamnophilus caerulescens

A few seen during our walk along the 101, in Iguazú National Park.

Rufous-winged AntshrikeThamnophilus torquatus

Superb views of a pair, along the Geladeira Road in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Plain Antvireo Dysithamnus mentalis

Only recorded along the Macuco Trail.

Spot-winged Antshrike Pygiptila stellaris

Males and females seen at the drinking pool, Cristalino.

White-eyed Antwren Epinecrophylla leucopthalma

One, seen in the understory, at Cristalino.

Pygmy Antwren Myrmotherula brachyura

Just the one sighting, at Cristalino.

Amazonian Streaked Antwren Myrmotherula multostriata

From the floating dock at Cristalino, on our first afternoon.

Sclater's Antwren Myrmotherula sclateri

Great looks during from Tower 1, Cristalino.

White-flanked Antwren Myrmotherula axillaris

Several sightings – mostly in Argentina.

Black-bellied Antwren Formicivora melanogaster

Good looks at a pair, at Pousada Piuval.

Rusty-backed Antwren Formicivora rufa

Also seen well – along the Agua Fria road, Chapada dos Guimarães.

Bertoni's Antwren Drymophila rubricollis

Eventually seen well by all at Urugua-I Provincial Park.

Dusky-tailed AntwrenDrymophila malura

Also only seen at Urugua-i Provincial Park.

Streak-capped Antwren *Terenura maculata*

Seen really well from both towers at Cristalino.

Chestnut-vented Conebill Conirostrum speciosum

A few good sightings in Iguazú National Park.

Red (-crested) **Pileated Finch**Coryphospingus cucullatus

Common in the Chapada dos Guimarães area but first seen along the Macuco Trail in Iguazú.

Saffron Finch Sicalis flaveola

Almost daily sightings until we reached Cristalino.

Wedge-tailed Grass Finch Emberizoides herbicola
A few encounters in the Chapada dos Guimarães area and at Pousada Piuval.
Blue-black Grassquit Volatinia jacarina

Most common in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

Plumbeous Seedeater Sporophila plumbea

Also not uncommon around Chapada dos Guimarães.

Rusty-collared Seedeater Sporophila collaris

Almosy daily sightings in the Pantanal.

Lined Seedeater Sporophila lineola

Just a few sightings, beginning with one along the *Transpantaneira*, during our drive to Porto Jofre.

Double-collared Seedeater Sporophila caerulescens

Commonly sighted during the first half of the trip.

White-bellied Seedeater Sporophila leucoptera
One sighting – along the Transpantaneira, during our drive to Porto Jofre.
Chestnut-bellied Seed Finch Oryzoborus angolensis

Sightings along the Pousada Curicaca entrance road and on islands in the Teles Pires River.

Grosbeaks, Saltators & Allies Cardinalidae

Red Tanager Piranga flava

First seen in Araucaria, near Puerto Iguazú.

Red-crowned Ant TanagerHabia rubica

A few along the Macuco Trail and at Cristalino.

Rose-breasted Chat Granatellus pelzelni

A pair seen at Cristalino.

Yellow-shouldered Grosbeak Parkerthraustes humeralis

Great views from both towers at Cristalino.

Blackish-blue Seedeater Amaurospiza moesta

Seen by just a few of us – at Urugua-I Provincial Park.

Slate-colored Grosbeak Saltator grossus

Seen from Tower 1 at Cristalino.

Black-throated GrosbeakA great view of one, along the Macuco Trail in Iguazú National Park.

Buff-throated SaltatorSaltator maximus

Seen in the grounds of Pousada do Parque.

Green-winged SaltatorSaltator similis

A few good sightings in Argentina.

Greyish Saltator Saltator coerulescens

A regular sight during the Pantanal section of the trip.

Black-throated SaltatorSaltator atricollis

Good views, daily, in the Chapada dos Guimarães area.

List of Mammals Encountered:

Crab-eating Fox Cerdocyon thous

Several great encounters in the Pantanal.

Maned Wolf Chrysocyon brachyurus

An unforgettable encounter at Pousada do Parque!

Jaguar Panthera onca

One seen on our first morning on the Tres Irmãos River took the 'edge' off for the rest of our stay in the area though some were lucky enough to have a second incredible encounter.

Neotropical Otter *Lontra longicaudis*

First spotted at Curicaca.

Giant Otter *Pteronura brasiliensis* Several memorable encounters during our time in the Pantanal and at Cristalino.

South American CoatiNasua nasua

Hard to miss in Iguazú National Park!

Crab-eating Raccoon Procyon cancrivorus

Some great close-ups during our stay at Pousada Curicaca.

Marsh Deer Blastocerus dichotomus

Sighted in several areas of the Pantanal.

Red Brocket Mazama americana

Sightings in all major areas visited on the trip.

Gray Brocket Mazama gouazoubira

A couple of sightings in the Pantanal.

White-lipped Peccary Tayassu pecari

One very large heard encountered in the forest at Cristalino.

Proboscis BatRhynchonycteris naso

Seen most days during our time at Cristalino.

Lesser Sac-winged (White-lined) Bat Saccopteryx leptura

A couple of us saw this species roosting in one of the buildings at Cristalino.

Lesser Bulldog (Fishing) Bat

Noctilio albiventris

Seen around the Cuiabá River.

Greater Bulldog (Fishing) Bat

Noctilio leporinus

Also seen around the Cuiabá River, as well as at Cristalino.

Brazilian Rabbit / Hare (Tapeti)

Sylvilagus brasiliensis

One seen briefly, and not that well, near Pousada Curicaca, during our night walk there.

Yellow Armadillo

Euphractus sexcinctus

Great views of one in the road to Pousada Rio Claro.

Tapeti (Brazilan Hare)

Sylvilagus brasiliensis

A couple seen on our night drive between Pousada Rio Claro and Pousada Curicaca.

Lowland (Brazilian) Tapir

Tapirus terrestris

Great looks at several at Cristalino.

Giant Anteater

Myrmecophaga tridactyla

Eventually found – on our final morning in the Pantanal!

Collared Anteater (Southern Tamandua)

Tamandua tetradactyla

Two great sightings – one crossing the road to Pousada Curicaca, another from Tower 2 at Cristalino!

Feline (Azara's) Night Monkey

Aotus (azarae) infulatus

Spotted by some of us at Cristalino.

Red-handed Howler Monkey

Alouatta belzebul

Heard on most mornings at Cristalino, seen very well during our boat ride out of the reserve.

Black-and-gold Howler Monkey

Alouatta caraya

Great views in several areas of the Pantanal. Note that this species is sometimes called Black Howler Monkey.

White-cheeked Spider Monkey

Ateles marginatus

Some great looks during our time at Cristalino.

Black-tailed (Pantanal) Marmoset

Mico melanurus

A few, at Pousada Piuval.

Brown Capuchin

Cebus apella

There is considerable debate, and confusion, over the taxonomy of capuchin monkeys. What is relevant to us regards the complex that was once only believed to be one species – **Brown Capuchin**. We saw three different 'types' that fall within this complex – *nigritus* (Iguazú), *libidinosus* (in the Pantanal and Chapada) and *apella* (in the Cristalino area). Should you choose to accept more liberal classifications, the former is a species often called Bearded Capuchin or even Black-striped Tufted Capuchin, the second is called Black-horned Capuchin, while the latter has various names, including Brown Tufted Capuchin, Brown-tufted Capuchin and Guianan Capuchin.

(H) Red-bellied Titi

Callicebus moloch

Heard at Cristalino.

Red-nosed Bearded Saki

Chiropotes albinasus

We had some great looks at this super little primate at Cristalino.

Brazilian Cavy Cavia aperia

The little guys seen running around the grounds of Pousada do Parque are apparently of this species.

Capybara Hydrochoerus hydrochaeris

Very common in the Pantanal.

Spotted Paca

Agouti paca

One spotted on the edge of the Cristalino River.

Azara's Agouti

Dasyprocta azarae

A handful of sightings – shared between the Iguazú area and the Pantanal.

Short-tailed Opossum

Monodidelphis sp.

We saw one of these little creatures in Iguazú National Park.

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
