Tour Summary

Our tour to northernmost Finland and Norway, collectively known as Lapland, was a true Arctic experience this year. The winter was very late, and consequently virtually all the rivers and lakes in the north were still frozen when we arrived, although the roads were completely clear. It made for some challenging birding, with winter visitors such as Steller's and King Eiders still present, but some of the regular summer visitors were absent. Nevertheless, as the trip progressed, the warming temperatures quickly melted some of the lakes, and we managed to find almost all our targets. Highlights this year included at least 15 White-billed Divers (Yellowbilled Loons), a flock of 250 King Eiders, more than 30 Capercaillies (mostly females), many

displaying Ruffs, and of course amazing views of six species of owls.

The tour commenced in Ivalo, from where we headed north. At our first stop, we found a flock of Taiga Bean Geese and a few other waterbirds. Later, a stop at a roadside café was particularly successful with large numbers of Pine Grosbeaks and Bramblings, as well as several Siberian Tits. After a fine lunch in Utsjoki, we crossed into Norway and headed to Varanger Fjord. Following the northern side of the huge fjord we made several stops. A brief sighting of a Brent Goose at Varangerbotn was an unusual record for the area, while a large flock of Tundra Bean Geese was a welcome addition to the list. We clocked up many waterbirds, waders and White-tailed Eagles, but the real highlight of the day was a flock of 16

Steller's Eiders offshore. Then a dozen of them flew to the shore where they delighted the photographers at close range for as long as we wanted to watch them. This special species is a celebrated winter visitor to Varanger, but most of them have left by May, and this was Rockjumper's first sighting of the species in Norway.

On our second day we boarded a small boat for the short ride to Hornoya, Varanger's famous seabird colony. A Brünnich's Guillemot (Thick-billed Murre) on the water just outside Vardo harbour was a good omen. But when we arrived the cliffs were full of noisy Kittiwakes, but completely devoid of auks. Offshore, there were huge rafts of auks loafing around, too far away to scope. But by mid-morning, these vast flocks of auks began winging their way over our heads to the mighty cliffs. Soon, the cliffs were teeming with auks, their incessant cries almost deafening. It was an incredible spectacle and a

photographer's dream. Puffins were especially popular, but the Shags were both comical and very striking, and the Razorbills and Guillemots were very dapper. We found quite a few more Brünnich's, but they were far outnumbered by the Common Guillemots. The afternoon was cut short by rain, but many Snow Buntings and a Glaucous Gull were the highlights.

An adult Glaucous Gull got our third day off to a good start, but much of the morning was spent chasing King Eiders. In the end we saw about 20 birds, mostly immature males or females, but the total included a couple of fully adult males although both were a bit distant. The flocks of eiders and Long-tailed Ducks were being continually disturbed by a couple of whaling ships that were hunting a Minke Whale in the channel. Fortunately, the whale eluded the ships, and lived to fight another day. At Kiberg, prolonged views of a group of Fin Whales was an unexpected treat. In the afternoon we visited Hamningberg where we found no fewer than eight Yellow-billed Loons on the sea, plus a summer-plumaged Common Loon and a single Pomarine Skua.

We left Vardo, and headed back west along Varanger Fjord. At Vadso, there were no fewer than 30

Steller's Eiders. An obliging Willow Ptarmigan was also notable. The journey over the snowy hills to Batsfjord proved to be very quiet. A few Horned Larks and several flocks of Snow Buntings were almost the only birds of note before we arrived at a rather wintry Batsfjord.

It was gloriously sunny for our full day in the Batsfjord area and the snowy mountains and picturesque fjords made for some dramatic scenery. Our first success was Rock Ptarmigan, and after a distant bird, we found a pair right beside the road. Shortly after, some Willow Ptarmigan provided a useful comparison between the two. Our seawatch at Berlevag was very

rewarding, despite there being little obvious movements of birds. A flock of 250 King Eiders was particularly noteworthy, but another 7 White-billed Divers and a pair of Brünnich's Guillemots were also welcome. Unfortunately, several Manx Shearwaters were rather distant. In the afternoon we visited Syltefjord where we added Lapland Longspur and Ring Ouzel to the list.

Leaving the tundra of Varanger behind, we had more great views of Rock Ptarmigan before heading back into Finland and the taiga zone. On the way, some Merlins showed well

close to the road. In the afternoon, we stopped again at the Pine Grosbeak café, and soon after we found our first Ruffs – two gorgeous males displaying right beside the road. Closer to Ivalo, two female Capercaillies were also found next to the road.

The journey to Kuusamo was long and wet, but we managed a few productive stops on the way. The most outstanding feature of the journey was the number of grouse right beside the road, even on the main roads and throughout the day. By the end of the day we had counted no fewer than 15 Black Grouse and 12 Capercaillies – and all were females. Then, in the late afternoon we chanced on a lek of 5 male Black Grouse which performed well for us. Other highlights of the day included a spectacular lek of Ruffs, two male Smew, a pair of Black-throated Divers, and our first Little Gulls. We also found three Pink-footed Geese, a scarce visitor to Finland.

An early morning excursion near Kuusamo provided fabulous views of several Siberian Jays, but most other birds were rather inactive due to the cold conditions. The highlight of the morning was seeing several Rustic Buntings. In the afternoon we headed to the Russian border and Lake Vuotunki. Good

birds included great views of Bohemian Waxwings, more lekking Black Grouse, more roadside Capercaillies and hundreds of Little Gulls.

Our second day in the Kuusamo area was just as cold, with frequent short snow showers. Passerines were again rather inactive, but eventually a Red-flanked Bluetail perched up in a spell of sunshine and showed well to everyone. The rest of the morning was devoted to looking for Hazel Grouse, but despite valiant attempts only brief views were obtained by most. However, in the afternoon we finally encountered a pair of Hazel Grouse by the roadside, and the male perched up in a bare tree giving superb views for several minutes. Many lakes in the area were still completely frozen but after checking several of the unfrozen ones we finally managed to find a group of Velvet Scoters, as well as a few more Smew.

Leaving Kuusamo, headed southwest to Oulu. There was a dramatic improvement in the weather as the day progressed, with sunny conditions and no snow at all around Oulu. On finally the way, we connected with a male Capercaillie by the roadside, having seen more than 30 females. In the afternoon, we visited various sites in the Tyrnava area where we had fantastic views of Boreal and Eurasian Pygmy Owls, but a Ural Owl at its nest only showed its tail.

Our final full day in the Oulu area saw us completing our

owl list. First up was a Great Grey Owl on its nest, but there was no sign of the male. As we were leaving, the male hooted and we rushed back into the forest where we enjoyed amazing prolonged views of him in the open. Next, we visited a Ural Owl nest containing at least one young, which gave occasional views. But nearby one of the adults was perched prominently in the open, and in sunshine. We returned to coast, to the magnificent wetland of Liminka Bay. There were hundreds of Ruffs there, together with a wide range of waterbirds. In the afternoon we saw a lone Northern Hawk Owl perched inconspicuously in a bare tree before returning to the bay near our hotel. It had been an unusual tour in terms of the weather, but with patience and effort we managed to see most of the specialities of these two delightful Nordic countries.

16 Vadsø 10.5 and 30 Vadsø 13.5. These immaculate lingerers from winter were voted second in the Bird of the Trip poll.

King Eider

Somateria spectabilis

2 Vardø 11.5, 20 off Vardø and Kiberg 12.5, and a flock of 250 offshore at Berlevåg 14.5.

Common Eider (NT)

Somateria mollissima

Very common around Varanger and seen each day there. There were many hundreds off Kiberg 11.5.

Velvet Scoter (VU)

Melanitta fusca

A group of 8 at Vuotunki 18.5.

Common Scoter

Long-tailed Duck (VU)

Clangula hyemalis

Very common around Varanger, especially off Vardø and Kiberg; very large flocks off Kiberg 11.5.

Common Goldeneve

Common in Finland and seen on most lakes there, but largely absent from Varanger.

Smew

Small numbers were seen most days, but rarely more than 10 per day.

Small numbers seen each day in Varanger, with a peak count of 30 on 12.5. In Finland, 10 Kemijärvi 16.5 and 6 Kempele Bay 20.5.

Commonly seen in both countries: 4 Varanger Fjord 10.5, 1 Kiberg 11.5, 3 Varanger Fjord 12.5, 30 Tana-

Båtsfjord 13.5, 10 Båtsfjord–Berlevåg 14.5, 10 Båtsfjord–Utsjoki 15.5, 30 Kuusamo 17.5 and 58 Vuotunki 18.5.

Common Ringed Plover Charadrius hiaticula

Singles on three days at Vardø 11–13.5, 2 Kemijärvi 16.5 and 10 Liminka Bay 20.5.

Sandpipers & Snipes Scolopacidae

Eurasian WhimbrelNumenius phaeopus phaeopus

2 Varanger Fjord 12.5, 4 Syltefjord 14.5, 1 Utsjoki–Ivalo 15.5, 2 Båtsfjord–Utsjoki 15.5, 1 Ivalo–Kuusamo 16.5, 1 Kuusamo 17.5 and 1 Vuotunki 18.5.

There were several hundred at Liminka Bay on 20.5. This species was voted Bird of the Trip.

Dunlin Calidris alpina

At least 100 Liminka Bay 20.5 and 30 Kempele Bay 21.5.

Purple Sandpiper Calidris maritima

Up to 20 per day in Varanger 10–15.5.

Eurasian Woodcock Scolopax rusticola

1 at dusk at Kempele Bay 20.5.

Common Snipe Gallinago gallinago gallinago

Singles of pairs were seen or heard on most days.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

1 Vuotunki 17.5 and 1 Kempele Bay 20.5.

Green Sandpiper Tringa ochropus 1 Ivalo-Kuusamo 16.5, 2 Vuotunki 17.5, 1 Vuotunki 18.5 and 1 Kärsämä 20.5. **Common Redshank** Tringa totanus

4 Varanger Fjord 10.5, 1 Varanger Fjord 12.5, 1 Vadsø 13.5, 6 Syltefjord 14.5, and up to 4 Kempele Bay 20-21.5.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

1 seen briefly at Kempele Bay 19.5 (leaders only).

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

Small numbers were seen on every day in Finland, with a peak count of 20 on 20.5; none at all in Norway.

Spotted Redshank Tringa erythropus

1 heard Nesseby 10.5, 2 seen Vuotunki 18.5, 1 heard Kempele Bay 19.5 and 1 seen Kempele Bay 21.5.

Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

Singles or pairs were seen on nine days, mostly in Finland.

Gulls, Terns & Skimmers Laridae

Black-legged Kittiwake Rissa tridactyla tridactyla Very common in Varanger, notably at Hornøya and Ekkerøy/Kiberg.

Black-headed Gull Chroicocephalus ridibundus

Small numbers seen every day in Finland, but only a few in Norway: 2 Vadsø 10.5, 2 Båtsfjord 13.5, 1 Båtsfjord 14.5 and 1 Vadsø 13.5.

Little Gull Hydrocoloeus minutus

10 Kemijärvi 16.5, at least 100 Torankijarvi 17.5 and at least 100 Vuotunki 17–18.5.

Common Gull Larus canus canus

Very common throughout and seen virtually every day.

Great Black-backed Gull Larus marinus

Common in Varanger, but not seen in Finland.

Glaucous Gull Larus hyperboreus hyperboreus 1 Kiberg 11.5, 1 Vardø 12.5, 1 Vardø 13.5 and 1 Syltefjord 14.5.

Iceland Gull

Larus glaucoides

1 immature between Vardø and Hamningberg 12.5.

European Herring Gull

Commonly seen in Varanger (Norway), but smaller numbers in Finland.

Lesser Black-backed Gull

Larus fuscus

2 at the rubbish dump in Kuusamo 17.5.

Little Tern Sternula albifrons albifrons

2 Kempele Bay 21.5.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo hirundo

2 Kemijärvi 16.5, 2 Torankijarvi 17.5, 2 Vuotunki 17–18.5, 1 Kuusamo–Oulu 19.5, and up to 20 Kempele Bay 20–21.5.

Arctic Tern Sterna paradisaea

2 Varanger Fjord 12.5, 4 Kemijärvi 16.5 and 1 Vuotunki 17.5. A very poor showing for this species. Most had simply not arrived yet.

Skuas Stercorariidae

Pomarine Jaeger/Pomarine Skua

Stercorarius pomarinus

1 flew past during a seawatch between Vardø and Hamningberg 12.5.

Parasitic Jaeger/Arctic Skua

Stercorarius parasiticus

Up to 30 per day Varanger Fjord 10–13.5, 10 Syltefjord 14.5, 10 Berlevåg 14.5 and 5 Båtsfjord–Utsjoki 15.5.

Auks Alcidae

Thick-billed Murre/Brünnich's Guillemot

Uria lomvia lomvia

At least 50 Hornøya 11.5 and 2 Berlevåg 14.5.

Common Murre/Common Guillemot

Uria aalge

Thousands on and around Hornøya 10.5, and a few others on other days.

Razorbill (NT)

Alca torda

Hundreds on and around Hornøya 10.5, and a few others on other days; 1 Berlevåg 14.5.

Black Guillemot

Cepphus grylle

Small numbers each day in Varanger; the largest count was 40 at Berlevåg 14.5. **Atlantic Puffin (VU)** *Fratercula arctica*

Many on or around Hornøya 10.5.

Traiercuia arciica

Loons/Divers *Gaviidae*

Red-throated Loon/Diver

Gavia stellata

10 Varanger Fjord 10.5, 15 Vardø–Hamningberg 12.5, 4 Båtsfjord 13.5, 4 Båtsfjord 14.5, 6 Syltefjord 14.5, 10 Berlevåg 14.5, 4 Båtsfjord–Utsjoki 15.5 and 2 Kemijärvi 16.5.

Black-throated Loon/Diver

Gavia arctica arctica

2 Ivalo–Kuusamo 16.5, 4 Noitiniemi 17.5, 10 Torankijarvi 17.5, 1 Kallunkijarvi 18.5, 3 Vuotunki 18.5 and 1 Kempele Bay 20–21.5. None in Norway.

Common Loon/Great Northern Diver

Gavia immer

1 in summer plumage on the sea between Vardø and Hamningberg 12.5.

Yellow-billed Loon/White-billed Diver (NT)

Gavia adamsii

3 Vardø–Hamningberg 12.5, 5 Hamningberg 12.5 and 7 Berlevåg 14.5. All but two were in full summer plumage.

Petrels & Shearwaters *Procellariidae*

Northern Fulmar

Fulmarus glacialis

About 20 at Berlevåg, Varanger 14.5.

Manx Shearwater

Puffinus puffinus
