Tour Summary

East Africa is certainly a must-visit destination for any wildlife and bird enthusiast. This trip certainly delivered in creating great memories and producing some remarkable sightings. We first explored northern Tanzania; namely Tarangire, Ngorongoro and the Serengeti. Here, we had exceptional sightings of many bird species, great mammal interactions and fantastic scenery. Kenya delivered too, as we moved from Amboseli to Mount Kenya. The drier northern part of Kenya was another highlight, bringing us many new species towards the end of an already busy tour! We had so many great sightings and also some rare ones too. We managed a lot of fun with a total of 521 species of bird and 58 mammal species to boot.


We started off this much-awaited tour, at the base of Mount Meru – a fantastic starting location! This region held many forest fauna and we were rewarded with sightings such as Green-backed Honeybird, Brown-breasted Barbet, African Wood Owl, Taveta Weaver, African Black Duck and even Black-throated Wattle-eye. This area also gave us the chance to familiarize ourselves with some species we would see many of.

We then headed west, into the drier regions of Tanzania. We left Arusha and found ourselves in the

majestic and extremely scenic Tarangire National Park. The rolling hillsides, studded with huge baobab trees, were our setting for the next couple of nights. We had a fantastic introduction here with many great sightings. Our first large mammal sightings here included African Elephant and African Buffalo, whilst smaller critters included Klipspringer and Yellow-spotted Hyrax; not to forget the Olive Baboons roosting in the tall palm trees. We had many great bird sightings too. Notable sightings included Ashy Yellow-collared Starling, Lovebird, Golden-backed Weaver, Knob-billed

Duck, White-bellied Bustard, Red-and-yellow Barbet as well as our first hornbills, bee-eaters, cordon-bleus and eagles. We also enjoyed a relaxed pair of African Scops Owl roosting on the grounds of where we were staying.

We then ventured up the escarpment and toward Ngorongoro. Our lodge, near Karatu, was fantastic for sunbirds and gave us superb looks at Variable, Malachite and Bronzy Sunbirds! From here, we found our way up, and eventually into the famous Ngorongoro Crater Rim and floor. This is the world's largest intact caldera and a wet morning saw us carefully skirting around a few stuck trucks! *Welcome to Africa!* The room, with its scenic moist forests, gave us some superb birds such as Schalow's Turaco, Abyssinian Crimsonwing, Golden-winged, Malachite and Bronzy Sunbirds, Brown Parisoma, Purple Grenadier,

Hildebrandt's Francolin and many Augur Buzzards. We eventually got to the crater floor and were greeted by herds herds upon mammals. We had super sightings of African Elephant, large herds of African Buffalo crossing in front of our vehicle, large numbers of Plain's Zebra, Common

Wildebeest. Common Eland, Grant's and Thomson's Gazelles and even Lion and African Golden Wolf. Birds were a major highlight here too, especially around Lake Magadi. Here, we had close-up encounters with Saddle-billed and Yellow-billed Storks, Red-billed and Hottentot Teals, Greater and Lesser Flamingos alongside hundreds of waders and other shorebirds. Here we also saw the gaudy Grey Crowned Crane, Rosythroated Longclaw, Hildebrandt's, Rufous-tailed and Superb Starlings and the world's heaviest flying bird Kori Bustard.

We finally made our way to the vast Serengeti! En route, we visited the world-famous Oldupai Gorge where the Leeky family made some important archaeological findings. Nearby, we also managed to visit a Masaai Village. We experienced their way of life and learnt a lot about this primitive and very traditional culture.

The Serengeti was to be our home for the following three nights, and what a fantastic time we had. Most notable were some of the mammalian sightings, such as a large pride of lions managing to take down an old buffalo bull. This is definitely a once in a life-time sighting and the pride even decided to seek shade under our vehicle! We also found our only Leopard here. A truly magnificent individual lying in a tree. Here, we also found our only Serval! Birds were plentiful; and this biome actually holds the most mass of birds out of any other biome in the world! We had a great time filtering through the common species

and managed some great sightings of Karamoja Apalis, Eastern Plantain-eater, Black-headed Gonolek, Miombo Wren-Warbler, Grey-headed Silverbill, Grey-breasted Spurfowl, Mocking Cliff-Chat, Black-lored Babbler, Little and Black-necked Weavers, Steel-blue Whydah, Dark Chanting Goshawk, Secretarybird, Fischer's Lovebird, Black Coucal and all the species of vulture at the lion kill!

We spent another night in the Arusha area, before making our way to Kenya. En route, we made an important stop near the border. Here, we looked for the super rare and endangered Beesley's Lark. We managed to find 5 individuals, a lucky find indeed!

Our first destination in Kenya was the world-renowned Amboseli National Park. The large wetland and surrounding planes were explored well, with Kilimanjaro as a backdrop! Once again, many mammals

were seen here, including our first Cheetah and the odd-looking Gerenuk! Wetland birds were plentiful and we had close-up looks at all. Notable was the rare Red-throated Pipit, superblooking Greater Painted Snipe, Great White Pelican, Pied Avocet, Long-toed Lapwing alongside many other waders, terns and lapwings. The surrounding savannah proved good for Tawny Eagle, Lesser and Greater Kestrels, Amur Falcon, Buff-crested and Blackbellied Bustards and both Chestnutbellied and Black-faced Sandgrouses.

We painstakingly managed to wangle our way through the heavily populated Nairobi. A reward for our effort was a

group of Hinde's Babbler! A rather range restricted species. We eventually reached our quaint lodge on Mount Kenya! The surrounding forests were explored for the next couple of days and we were rewarded with superb looks at Olive Ibis – perched! Normal views are of flying birds, but this shy forest ibis decided to perch in some trees, on both our mornings here! We scoured through the forest on foot, searching for anything that moved. We had great looks at Abbott's Starling, Orange White-tailed Ground Thrush. Crested Flycatcher, Hartlaub's Turaco, Brown-capped Weaver,

Tullberg's Woodpecker, White-headed Woodhoopoe, Tacazze Sunbird, Grey-headed Nigrita, Mountain and Cape Wagtail as well as a fantastic perched Crowned Eagle!

We had to leave this great forest, unfortunately, but more was in store for us on this great tour. We next found ourselves in the dry northern part of Kenya. We stayed in a superb lodge in Shaba for three nights and explored the Shaba, Buffalo Springs and Samburu areas from here. The first afternoon here already gave us a coalition of Cheetah! Afterwards, our first morning was spent searching for the extremely localized William's Lark. We struck gold by finding a pair, feeding amongst some rocks in lava planes. Other species were numerous including gems such as Eastern Yellow-billed Hornbill, Golden-breasted and Magpie Starlings, Northern Brownbul, Black-bellied, Hunter's and Shining Sunbirds, Somali Courser, Three-streaked Tchagra, Common Rock Thrush, Acacia Tit, Grant's Wood-hoopoe, Somali and White-throated Bee-eaters, Lichtenstein's Sandgrouse and of course, many Somali Ostrich and the gaudy Vulturine Guineafowl. Mammals were a superb feature here too. We had super looks at the Reticulated

sub-species of Giraffe, Beisa Oryx, Greater Kudu, Desert Warthog and the stunning Grevy's Zebra!

We made our way back to Nairobi, visiting Lake Nakuru for a single night. En route, we had a fantastic roosting Cape Eagle-Owl, Boran Cisticola, Holub's Golden Weaver and African Black Swift. A small forest en route also gave us more White-starred Robin. Whitebellied Tit, Hartlaub's Turaco and our only Narina Trogon. We Nakuru and reached after checking in to our superb lodge – explored the shorelines of this now flooded lake. Waterbirds were plentiful, including Black-tailed Godwit, Whiskered, White-winged and Gull-billed Terns, Temminck's Stint, African Darter and more cranes, storks and pelicans. We also great looks at our only White Rhinoceros of the trip, and a majestic sighting of a pair of big male Lions! All before a huge deluge of rain happened upon us.

The tour had unfortunately reached its final day. A few more new sightings awaited though, and came in the form of Jameson's Firefinch, White-crested Helmetshrike, Jackson's Widowbird and the range-restricted Sharpe's Longclaw. We reached Nairobi and had to say our goodbyes to one another. We reminisced about all the fun we had and were lucky to have created superb memories in these tough times for travel.

Coqui Francolin Peliperdix coqui

Seen well in Tarangire NP and Serengeti NP

Crested Francolin Dendroperdix sephaena

Good views of small family groups in both countries

Scaly Francolin Pternistis squamatus

Heard only, on the 20th in Castle Forest

Jackson's Francolin Pternistis jacksoni

We managed to find a pair! New to our Rockjumper tours for this circuit!

Hildebrandt's Francolin

Pternistis hildebrandti

Common in Tarangire and Ngorongoro NP's

Yellow-necked Spurfowl Pternistis leucoscepus

Common resident

Grey-breasted Spurfowl –E Pternistis rufopictus

Common endemic seen well only in Serengeti NP

Red-necked SpurfowlPternistis afer

Common only in Tarangire NP

Harlequin Quail Coturnix delegorguei delegorguei

Flushed in Tarangire NP as well as in Amboseli NP

Common throughout

Also known as Eared Grebe. Seen only once on Lake Magadi inside Ngorongoro caldera

Large flocks seen in all large waterbodies
