Tour Summary

Thailand is rightfully one of the premier destinations in Asia, and this tour showcases the very best birding to be found in here. Full of enthusiasm, our intrepid group gathered in our central Bangkok hotel for a welcome dinner, eagerly anticipating the many delights to come. There were so many highlights that it is hard to single any out, but in the days to come we were to enjoy a feast of pheasants, pigeons,

bee-eaters, hornbills, barbets, woodpeckers, broadbills, pittas, minivets, warblers, babblers, flycatchers, sunbirds, and even bulbuls. There were some great mammals too, with four species of monkeys, two gibbons, Yellow-throated Marten, Malayan Porcupine and the elusive Chinese Serow.

Our adventure began in Bangkok, as we braved the early morning traffic to head south-west to the saltpans near Phetchaburi. We spent most of the day watching waders at a number of sites, in search of the many specialities that can be found in this area. With careful scanning, our targets soon began to reveal themselves and we enjoyed

superb views of Lesser and Greater Sand Plovers, Pacific Golden Plover, Red-necked, Long-toed and Temminck's Stints, Curlew and Marsh Sandpipers, and Black-tailed and Bar-tailed Godwits. There were also many Brown-headed Gulls and a good variety of terns, including Caspian, Gull-billed and Great Crested. A single Red-necked Phalarope put in a brief appearance, and the presence of more than 250 Broad-billed Sandpipers was noteworthy. We did not have to wait long for our top target, and we were soon watching up to three Spoon-billed Sandpipers – surely one of the most sought-after birds on the planet. A short boat trip through the mangroves took us to a beautiful sandbar, where we found several pairs of striking Malaysian Plovers and two Chinese Egrets. Other birds in the mangroves included Golden-bellied Gerygone, Oriental Reed Warbler and Collared Kingfisher. We returned to a different area of the saltpans, where we found hundreds of Great Knots at roost and around 25 Nordmann's Greenshanks mixed in with them. After a bit of searching, we found a saltpan that contained 24 Asian

Dowitchers scattered across it – our final target of the day. Later, we continued to Kaeng Krachan for our first forest birding.

We spent two full days in Kaeng Krachan National Park, the first at higher elevations and the second lower down, and we managed to find a wonderful array of the park's specialities. On our first day, some of the memorable birds included Common Emerald Dove, Collared Owlet (being mobbed by a host of passerines), an obliging group of Tickell's Brown Hornbills, Blue-throated, Moustached and Blue-eared Barbets, Speckled and White-

browed Piculets, Vernal Hanging Parrot, Bamboo and Rufous Woodpeckers, Swinhoe's and Greychinned Minivets, Blyth's Shrike-Babbler, Black-naped Monarch, Blyth's Paradise Flycatcher, Common Green Magpie, Flavescent, Olive, Ochraceous, Mountain and Ashy Bulbuls, Yellow-bellied, Two-barred, Martens's and Alström's Warblers, White-browed and (for some) Red-billed Scimitar Babblers, Golden, Collared and Buff-breasted Babblers, Pin-striped Tit-Babbler, Everett's White-eye, Asian Fairy-bluebird, Velvet-fronted Nuthatch, Dark-sided, Rufous-browed and Hill Blue Flycatchers, Blue-winged

Leafbird and Ruby-cheeked Sunbird. Unfortunately, although we heard both Grey Peacock-Pheasant and Ratchet-tailed Treepie, we were unable to entice them into view. It was a good day for mammals too, with both Dusky and Banded Langurs, Lar Gibbon and Yellow-throated Marten all showing well.

Our second day at lower altitude was very different, with little overlap in species. Some of the birds seen included Crested Honey Buzzard, Crested Goshawk, Thick-billed Green Pigeon, Green-billed Malkoha, great views of three Violet Cuckoos, including a

stunning male, Asian Barred Owlet, Grey-rumped Treeswift, three Orange-breasted Trogons, Oriental Dollarbird, Black-capped Kingfisher, Chestnut-headed Bee-eater, Heart-spotted Woodpecker, Greater Flameback, Black-thighed Falconet, Black-and-red, Banded and Black-and-yellow Broadbills, Great Iora, Racket-tailed Treepie, four Sultan Tits, Black-headed, Black-crested and Stripe-throated Bulbuls, Pale-legged Leaf Warbler, White-rumped Shama, Hainan Blue and Chinese Blue Flycatchers, Yellow-rumped Flycatcher, Thick-billed and Scarlet-backed Flowerpeckers, and Crimson Sunbird.

The lodge grounds at Kaeng Krachan are extensive and hold some excellent habitat. On our final morning, we spent a couple of hours exploring this, starting pre-dawn and finding amongst other things Black-winged Kite, Collared Scops Owl, Spotted Owlet, Large-tailed Nightjar, Lineated Barbet, Burmese Shrike, Indochinese Bush Lark, Rufous Treepie, Black-browed Reed Warbler. Thick-billed and Lanceolated Warblers, Taiga Flycatcher, Grey-breasted Prinia and Golden-fronted Leafbird. On our journey back towards Bangkok, we made several stops at various pools near the saltpans to look for any species that we still

needed, including Spot-billed Pelican, Black-headed Ibis and Indian Cormorant (the latter was seen side-by-side with Little). One of the better pools held several Cotton Pygmy Geese and Bronze-winged Jacanas, as well as a pair of Ruddy-breasted Crakes and two White-browed Crakes. Most of the afternoon was spent travelling north-east to Khao Yai.

We had two full days in Thailand's most famous national park, Khao Yai. On the first morning, we headed up the Khao Khiew road. A short side trail before the summit gave us great views of a spectacular group of three Silver Pheasants, including two stunning males. Nearby, we saw the first of five stunning Red-headed Trogons, and on the way back a female Chinese Serow and her well-grown calf crossed the trail right in front of us, totally unconcerned at our presence. What a great start to the day! Overhead, we

saw Crested Serpent Eagle, Rufous-bellied Hawk-Eagle and Black Eagle, as well as regular sightings of Great, Oriental Pied and Wreathed Hornbills. Much time was spent birding the roadside at lower elevation, and some of the species seen here included Red Junglefowl, Barred Cuckoo-Dove, Mountain Imperial Pigeon, Blue-bearded Bee-eater, Green-eared Barbet, Heart-spotted and Laced Woodpeckers, Greater Yellownape, Longtailed Broadbill, White-bellied Erpornis, Black-crested, Puff-throated and Grey-eyed Bulbuls, Radde's, Sulphur-breasted and Claudia's Leaf Warblers, Large Scimitar Puff-throated Babbler, Abbott's and

Babblers, White-crested, Lesser Necklaced and Black-throated Laughingthrushes, Chestnut-flanked White-eye, Golden-crested and Common Hill Mynas, Yellow-vented and Fire-breasted Flowerpeckers (the latter of the *cambodianum* race), Black-throated Sunbird and Little Spiderhunter. As usual, we spent some time looking for some of the more skulking species. We had great luck with an Orange-headed Thrush, and also with Siberian Blue Robin and an obliging male White-throated Rock Thrush. With some persistence, most people managed views of a couple of Blue Pittas, but several vocal Eared Pittas were less easy. On the mammalian side, we all saw a Pileated Gibbon and heard several others, and a wonderful Malayan Porcupine was active during the daytime as it foraged in a small garden before running off down the road. At dusk one evening, we found a pair of Brown Hawk-Owls, and two Great Eared Nightjars flew over at the edge of the park.

Before leaving our hotel at Khao Yai, we enjoyed good views of Plain-backed Sparrows in the garden and several Redbreasted Parakeets overhead. On our journey westwards, we made a stop at Lam Ta Klong. Along the dry margins of the lake, we found Rain Quail, Western Osprey, Horsfield's Bush Lark, Oriental Skylark, Cisticola, Eastern Yellow Wagtail and Paddy field Pipit. Our principal destination this morning was a monastery nestled amongst some isolated limestone hills in central Thailand. It was already hot when we arrived, but we had only one species in mind. This is a well-known site for the near-endemic

Limestone Wren-Babbler, and it did not take long to find one of these enigmatic birds foraging in the cracks on the cliff. We then headed back to Bangkok to catch the late afternoon flight to Chiang Mai,

stopping on the way at Rangsit marsh. Although it was not the best time of day, we managed to get views of two Pallas's Grasshopper Warblers and a few Asian Golden Weavers. Other new species for the trip included Pink-necked Green Pigeon, Blue-tailed Bee-eater and Yellow-vented Bulbul.

An early start the following morning took us to Huai Hong Khrai, on the outskirts of the city. This small area of protected forest is a well-known haunt of the magnificent and localised Green Peafowl. It didn't take long to find one, and eventually we had great views of two males, perched high in the trees and in flight! Other good birds here included Rosy Minivet and Tickell's Blue Flycatcher. A couple of stops at some paddy fields close to Chiang Mai got us some important wetland species, such as Pied Harrier, Grey-headed Pin-tailed and Lapwing, Snipe Avadavat. We also stopped at the Mae Thang

irrigation project, where we added Rufous-winged Buzzard, Black-collared Starling and Purple Sunbird. Our final destination of the day was Doi Chiang Dao. This forested mountain with a picturesque monastery looked very promising, but late afternoon is not as good as the morning, and we struggled to realise its potential; the only new species for the trip were Ashy Minivet, Eurasian Jay and Browncheeked Fulvetta.

Our next destination was Doi Lang, part of Doi Pha Hom Pok National Park. This relatively undisturbed mountain did not disappoint, and we encountered many northern specialities during our two days there. An early success was superb views of a pair of Giant Nuthatches, one of our top targets. Another key species, Mrs Hume's Pheasant, showed only briefly on our first day, and we had to wait until the following day before we saw this well. But the wait was well worth it. On our second visit, we positioned our bus at a strategic point along the road and waited. Sure enough, after a short while, a pair of these gorgeous pheasants appeared on the road, remaining for some time while we photographed them from

every angle. At various feeding stations, we found White-gorgeted and Ultramarine Flycatchers, Siberian Rubythroat, White-bellied Redstart and Spectacled Barwing. We had amazing views of a pair of Spot-breasted Parrotbills, and also found a large flock of Grey-headed Parrotbills. White-necked and Silver-eared Laughingthrushes showed well, as did Rusty-cheeked Scimitar Babbler. Other babblers included Blyth's Shrike-Babbler, Chestnut-capped and Rufous-fronted Babblers, Yunnan Fulvetta and Bluewinged Minla. A trio of sibias comprised Rufous-backed, Dark-backed and Long-

tailed. Leaf warblers were also well represented, with Buff-throated, Buff-barred, Grey-crowned, Pallas's Leaf, Hume's Leaf and Davison's Leaf Warblers all showing well. Not all the birds here were easy to see, and we struggled to get decent views of Mountain Bamboo Partridge, despite them being very vocal.

Amongst the many other species we saw on Doi Lang were Cook's Swift, Golden-throated Barbet, Crimson-breasted, Stripe-breasted and Bay Woodpeckers, Grey-headed Parakeet, Large Cuckooshrike, Long-tailed and Grey-backed Shrikes, Maroon Oriole, Grey Treepie, Yellow-bellied Fantail, Japanese and Yellow-cheeked Tits, Crested Finchbill, Brown-breasted and Flavescent Bulbuls, Aberrant Bush Warbler (another skulker!), Black-throated Bushtit, Hill Prinia, Chestnut-vented Nuthatch, Rufous-

gorgeted, Slaty-blue and Sapphire Flycatchers, Grey Bush Chat, Orange-bellied Leafbird, Mrs Gould's Sunbird, Streaked Spiderhunter, Olive-backed Pipit, Common Rosefinch and Crested Bunting.

Back in the lowlands, we made an afternoon visit to Tha Ton marsh which, sadly, is a shadow of its former self, having been largely converted to agricultural land. Here, we found Pied Harrier, Ruddy-breasted Crake, Barred Buttonquail, an obliging Eurasian Wryneck, Dusky Warbler and Baya Weaver. On some wet paddy fields, we

watched Red-throated Pipit and Citrine Wagtail, and a surprise find was three Ruddy Shelducks, a species that is rather scarce in Thailand. We spent some time trying to see the recently discovered Baikal Bush

Warbler that winters here. As expected, it wasn't easy to see, but most people saw something! The star bird of the afternoon, though, was Jerdon's Bush Chat. This shy and localised species likes tall grass, which is now in very short supply at Tha Ton. Uthai had not seen the species there for five years, but we found a pair which showed rather well, perching up for us across the river for some time before they retreated into the grass.

Our final destination in the north was Doi Angkhang, where much of our time was spent working the quiet roadsides. Not surprisingly, there was some overlap with

Doi Lang and other montane sites, but the highlights included another pair of Giant Nuthatches, a pair of very skulking Spot-throated Babblers and an obliging Chestnut-headed Tesia (well, obliging for a tesia at least!). At the Burmese border, we found two Daurian Redstarts and, at the nearby King's Project, a suite of elusive species showed well, including Streaked Wren-Babbler, Black-breasted and Eyebrowed

Thrushes, a very showy White-tailed Robin, and a lone Spot-winged Grosbeak. Other species noted in the area included Himalayan Swiftlet, Black Bulbul, Grey-capped Pygmy Woodpecker, Asian House Martin, Striated Swallow, Greenish Warbler, White-crowned Forktail, Slaty-backed Flycatcher and Plain Flowerpecker.

After a final morning on Doi Angkhang, we returned to Chiang Mai to catch a flight back to Bangkok and onwards home. It had been a memorable tour, with so many highlights. The sheer diversity of habitats and birds is one of the delights of a trip to Thailand.

Ducks, Geese and Swans Anatidae

Lesser Whistling Duck

Dendrocygna javanica

Flocks of up to 100 birds seen on three days.

Ruddy Shelduck

Tadorna ferruginea

Three were seen on a paddy field at Tha Ton; this species is rather scarce in Thailand.

Cotton Pygmy Goose

Nettapus coromandelianus coromandelianus

Six were seen on a roadside pool between Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Pheasants, Grouse and allies Phasianidae

Rain Quail Coturnix coromandelica

One was flushed at Lam Ta Klong.

Green-legged Partridge (H) Arborophila chloropus

Heard at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Mountain Bamboo Partridge Bambusicola fytchii fytchii

One was seen at Doi Lang and others were heard there.

Red Junglefowl Gallus gallus

Singles or pairs were recorded on four days.

Silver Pheasant Lophura nycthemera

Three were seen well in Khao Yai.

Mrs Hume's Pheasant (NT)

Syrmaticus humiae burmanicus

Four or five birds were seen on Doi Lang, with a male and female giving long and spectacular views.

Grey Peacock-Pheasant (H)

Polyplectron bicalcaratum

One was heard at Kaeng Krachan, and although close it could not be enticed out.

Green Peafowl (EN)

Pavo muticus imperator

Two males were seen well at Huai Hong Khrai, and others were heard there.

Grebes Podicipedidae

Little Grebe

Tachybaptus ruficollis poggei

Small numbers were recorded on three days.

Storks Ciconiidae

Painted Stork (NT) *Mycteria leucocephala*

A few were seen at the saltpans.

Asian OpenbillAnastomus oscitans

Good numbers were seen on three days, in open country and especially at the saltpans.

Ibises and Spoonbills Threskiornithidae

Black-headed Ibis Threskiornis melanocephalus

Two were seen on our second visit to the saltpans.

Herons, Egrets and Bitterns Ardeidae

Black-crowned Night Heron

Nycticorax nycticorax nycticorax

Two were seen in the mangroves at Laem Phak Bia.

Striated Heron *Butorides striata javanica*

Three singles were seen at various locations.

Chinese Pond HeronArdeola bacchus

Frequent sightings in open wetland areas. Only the birds in the north can be safely assigned to this species, but it is likely that they were seen throughout.

Javan Pond Heron

Ardeola speciosa continentalis

Although not positively identified on the tour due to similarities with Chinese Pond Heron in winter plumage, the birds seen on the saltpans SW of Bangkok and elsewhere in central Thailand are as likely to have been resident Javan as wintering Chinese.

Eastern Cattle Egret Bubulcus coromandus

Commonly encountered throughout the tour.

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea jouyi

Small numbers seen on three days.

Purple Heron Ardea purpurea manilensis

Several were seen on the saltpans.

Great Egret Ardea alba modesta

Small numbers were seen on four days.

Intermediate Egret Ardea intermedia intermedia

Only a few sightings.

Little Egret *Egretta garzetta garzetta*

Commonly encountered throughout the tour.

Pacific Reef Heron Egretta sacra sacra

A single bird was seen at Laem Phak Bia.

Chinese Egret (VU) Egretta eulophotes

Two were seen at Laem Phak Bia.

Pelicans Pelecanidae

Spot-billed Pelican (NT)Pelecanus philippensis

One bird was seen on our second visit to the saltpans.

Cormorants and Shags Phalacrocoracidae

Little Cormorant *Microcarbo niger*

Recorded on three days, notably at the saltpans.

Indian Cormorant Phalacrocorax fuscicollis

Good numbers at the saltpans where we were able to compare them side-by-side with Little

Cormorants.

Osprey Pandionidae

Western Osprey Pandion haliaetus haliaetus

One was seen at Lam Ta Klong.

Kites, Hawks and Eagles Accipitridae

Black-winged Kite Elanus caeruleus vociferus

Singles were seen on two occasions.

Crested Honey Buzzard Pernis ptilorhynchus

Three singles at widespread locations.

Crested Serpent Eagle Spilornis cheela

Heard at Kaeng Krachan, and seen well at Khao Yai.

Rufous-bellied Eagle Lophotriorchis kienerii formosus

One was seen at Khao Yai.

Black Eagle Ictinaetus malaiensis malaiensis

Two were seen at Khao Yai.

Crested Goshawk Accipiter trivirgatus indicus

Singles or pairs were seen on three days.

Pied Harrier Circus melanoleucos

Several good sightings over paddy fields near Chiang Mai, and also at Tha Ton marsh.

Black Kite Milvus migrans

Several sightings in open country on travel days.

Brahminy Kite Haliastur indus

Several were seen at the saltpans.

Rufous-winged BuzzardButastur liventer

Two were seen near Chiang Mai.

Eastern Buzzard Buteo japonicus japonicus

Two singles were seen at Doi Angkhang.

Rails, Crakes and Coots Rallidae

White-breasted Waterhen Amaurornis phoenicurus phoenicurus

Singles or pairs were seen on four days.

Ruddy-breasted CrakePorzana fusca

Two were seen on a pool between Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai, and another at Tha Ton.

White-browed Crake Porzana cinerea

Two showed well at a pool near the saltpans.

Common MoorhenGallinula chloropus

A single bird was seen at a roadside pool.

Buttonquails *Turnicidae*

Barred ButtonquailTurnix suscitator

One was seen at Tha Ton.

Thick-knees Burhinidae

Indian Stone-curlew (H)

Burhinus indicus

Heard at night at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Stilts and Avocets Recurvirostridae

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus himantopus

Very common on the saltpans, and a few others elsewhere.

Plovers and Lapwings *Charadriidae*

Grey-headed Lapwing Vanellus cinereus

About 40 were seen on paddy fields near Chiang Mai.

Red-wattled LapwingVanellus indicus atronuchalis

Commonly encountered throughout lowland areas.

Pacific Golden Plover Pluvialis fulva

About 10 were seen at the saltpans.

Grey Plover Pluvialis squatarola squatarola

Quite a few at the saltpans.

Little Ringed PloverCharadrius dubius jerdoni

Good numbers at Mae Taeng and Tha Ton, and a few others elsewhere.

Kentish Plover Charadrius alexandrinus

A few were seen at Laem Phak Bia.

Malaysian Plover (NT) Charadrius peronii

Eight birds were found at Laem Phak Bia, giving good views.

Lesser Sand PloverCharadrius mongolus schaeferi

Common on the saltpans and at Laem Phak Bia.

Greater Sand Plover Charadrius leschenaultii leschenaultii

Common on the saltpans and at Laem Phak Bia.

Jacanas Jacanidae

Bronze-winged Jacana Metopidius indicus

Four were seen on a pool between Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Sandpipers and allies Scolopacidae

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus variegatus

About 15 were seen on the saltpans.

Eurasian Curlew (NT)Numenius arquata orientalis

About 30 were seen on the saltpans.

Bar-tailed Godwit Limosa lapponica menzbieri

Several were seen on the saltpans.

Black-tailed Godwit (NT)

Limosa limosa melanuroides

Common on the saltpans.

Ruddy TurnstoneArenaria interpres interpres

Three were found on the saltpans.

Great Knot (VU) Calidris tenuirostris

Several large flocks on the saltpans.

Ruff Calidris pugnax

Three were found on the saltpans.

Broad-billed SandpiperCalidris falcinellus sibirica

Common on the saltpans, with around 250 birds seen.

Curlew SandpiperCalidris ferruginea

Common on the saltpans.

Temminck's StintCalidris temminckii

Two on the saltpans and one at Mae Taeng.

Long-toed Stint Calidris subminuta

Three were found on the saltpans.

Spoon-billed SandpiperCalidris pygmea

Three were seen well on the saltpans.

Red-necked StintCalidris ruficollis

Common on the saltpans.

Sanderling Calidris alba alba

Several were seen on the saltpans.

Asian Dowitcher (NT)Limnodromus semipalmatus

After a bit of searching, we found a loose flock of 24 on one of the saltpans.

Pin-tailed Snipe Gallinago stenura

Several were seen on paddy fields near Chiang Mai.

Common Snipe Gallinago gallinago gallinago

Three were found on paddy fields near Chiang Mai.

Red-necked PhalaropePhalaropus lobatus

One was seen briefly on the saltpans.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

Scattered sightings on four days.

Green Sandpiper Tringa ochropus

Two were seen on paddy fields near Chiang Mai.

Common Redshank Tringa totanus terrignotae

A few were seen on the saltpans.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

Common on the saltpans.

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

Scattered sightings on five days.

Spotted RedshankTringa erythropus

Several were seen on the saltpans.

Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

Several were seen on the saltpans.

Nordmann's Greenshank (EN)

Tringa guttifer

25 were counted amongst the Great Knots on the saltpans.

Gulls, Terns and Skimmers Laridae

Brown-headed Gull Chroicocephalus brunnicephalus

Common on the saltpans.

Gull-billed Tern Gelochelidon nilotica

Common on the saltpans.

Caspian Tern Hydroprogne caspia

About 30 were seen on the saltpans and at Laem Phak Bia.

Greater Crested Tern Thalasseus bergii

About 20 at Laem Phak Bia.

Little Tern Sternula albifrons sinensis

Common on the saltpans.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

Common on the saltpans.

Whiskered Tern Chlidonias hybrida

Quite a few were seen on both visits to the saltpans.

White-winged Tern Chlidonias leucopterus

At least one was seen on the saltpans.

Pigeons and Doves Columbidae

Rock Dove Columba livia var. domestica

Commonly encountered.

Red Turtle DoveStreptopelia tranquebarica humilis

Frequently seen in open country.

Spotted Dove Spilopelia chinensis

Frequently seen in open country.

Barred Cuckoo-Dove

Macropygia unchall minor

Several sightings in Khao Yai and on Doi Angkhang.

Common Emerald Dove

Chalcophaps indica indica

Several sightings in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Zebra Dove

Thick-billed Green Pigeon

Treron curvirostra

Frequent sightings in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Mountain Imperial Pigeon

Ducula badia griseicapilla

Small numbers were recorded on seven days.

Cuckoos Cuculidae

Greater Coucal

Centropus sinensis

Small numbers were frequently seen or heard.

Green-billed Malkoha

Phaenicophaeus tristis tristis

Several were seen in Kaeng Krachan, Khao Yai and on Doi Lang.

Asian Koel

Eudynamys scolopaceus

Regularly heard, and a few were seen as well.

Violet Cuckoo

Chrysococcyx xanthorhynchus xanthorhynchus

Three birds, including an adult male, showed well in the campsite at Kaeng Krachan. **Banded Bay Cuckoo** (H)

Cacomantis sonneratii

Singles were heard at Kaeng Krachan and Doi Chiang Dao.

Square-tailed Drongo-Cuckoo (H)

Surniculus lugubris

One was heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Owls Strigidae

Collared Scops Owl

Otus lettia lettia

Singles were seen at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Collared Owlet

Glaucidium brodiei brodiei

One was seen well at Kaeng Krachan and others were heard there and at Khao Yai.

Asian Barred Owlet

Glaucidium cuculoides

A single was seen at Kaeng Krachan and a pair at Huai Hong Khrai; also heard at Kaeng Krachan and

Khao Yai.

Spotted Owlet Athene brama

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Brown Hawk-Owl

Ninox scutulata burmanica

Two were seen at Khao Yai.

Frogmouths Podargidae

Hodgson's Frogmouth (H)

Batrachostomus hodgsoni indochinae

One was heard at Doi Angkhang.

Nightjars and allies Caprimulgidae

Great Eared Nightjar

Lyncornis macrotis cerviniceps

Two were seen at Khao Yai.

Large-tailed Nightjar

Caprimulgus macrurus bimaculatus

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Indian Nightjar (H)

Caprimulgus asiaticus asiaticus

One was heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Treeswifts Hemiprocnidae

Grey-rumped Treeswift

Hemiprocne longipennis harterti

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Swifts Apodidae

Himalayan Swiftlet Aerodramus brevirostris

A few were seen at Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Common in the lowlands of central Thailand.

Small numbers were seen on six days.

Small numbers were seen on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Trogons Trogonidae

Orange-breasted Trogon Harpactes oreskios

Three were seen at Kaeng Krachan and another heard at Khao Yai.

Red-headed TrogonHarpactes erythrocephalus

Five were seen during our two days at Khao Yai.

Rollers Coraciidae

Indian Roller Coracias benghalensis affinis

Small numbers were seen on seven days.

Oriental Dollarbird Eurystomus orientalis

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Kingfishers Alcedinidae

Banded Kingfisher (H)Lacedo pulchella

Singles were heard on two occasions at Khao Yai.

White-throated Kingfisher Halcyon smyrnensis perpulchra

Small numbers were seen on five days.

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Great Hornbill (NT) Buceros bicornis

Several sightings at Khao Yai; also heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Oriental Pied Hornbill Anthracoceros albirostris albirostris

Small numbers were seen on several occasions at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Tickell's Brown Hornbill (NT) Anorrhinus tickelli

Good views of five at Kaeng Krachan.

Wreathed Hornbill Rhyticeros undulatus

Several sightings at Khao Yai.

Asian Barbets Megalaimidae

Great Barbet (H) Psilopogon virens

Heard at Kaeng Krachan and Doi Lang.

Lineated Barbet Psilopogon lineatus hodgsoni

Several sightings on three days.

Green-eared Barbet Psilopogon faiostrictus

Several at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Golden-whiskered Barbet (H) Psilopogon chrysopogon laetus

Heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Golden-throated Barbet Psilopogon franklinii

One seen and another heard on Doi Lang.

Blue-throated Barbet Psilopogon asiaticus davisoni

Small numbers seen on five days.

Moustached Barbet Psilopogon incognitus

One seen at Kaeng Krachan and several at Khao Yai.

Blue-eared Barbet Psilopogon duvaucelii

Commonly heard and several seen at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Coppersmith Barbet Psilopogon haemacephalus indicus

Small numbers were seen or heard on five days.

Common Iora Aegithina tiphia

Singles or pairs on six days.

Great Iora Aegithina lafresnayei

Three at Kaeng Krachan and another at Khao Yai.

Cuckooshrikes Campephagidae

Large Cuckooshrike Coracina macei siamensis

Two were seen on Doi Lang.

Black-winged CuckooshrikeCoracina melaschistos avensis

Small numbers were seen on five days.

Rosy Minivet Pericrocotus roseus

Four were seen at Huai Hong Khrai.

Swinhoe's MinivetPericrocotus cantonensis

Small numbers on five days.

Ashy Minivet *Pericrocotus divaricatus*

Six were seen at Huai Hong Khrai.

Grey-chinned Minivet *Pericrocotus solaris*

A pair at Kaeng Krachan and another pair on Doi Lang.

Long-tailed MinivetPericrocotus ethologus

Six were seen on Doi Lang.

Short-billed Minivet *Pericrocotus brevirostris neglectus*

Four were seen on Doi Lang.

Scarlet Minivet Pericrocotus speciosus

Small numbers at Khao Yai, Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

White-bellied Erpornis

Erpornis zantholeuca

Several were seen at Khao Yai.

Blyth's Shrike-babbler

Pteruthius aeralatus

Seen or heard on several occasions, at Kaeng Krachan, Khao Yai and Doi Lang.

Old World Orioles Oriolidae

Black-naped Oriole

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan and another was heard.

Crows, Jays and Magpies Corvidae

Eurasian Jay

Garrulus glandarius leucotis

Several sightings in the north, especially on Doi Lang.

Common Green Magpie

Cissa chinensis chinensis

One seen at Kaeng Krachan and two more at Khao Yai.

Rufous Treepie

Dendrocitta vagabunda

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Grey Treepie Dendrocitta formosae assimilis

Four were seen on Doi Lang.

Racket-tailed Treepie Crypsirina temia

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Ratchet-tailed Treepie (H)

Temnurus temnurus

One was heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Eastern Jungle Crow Corvus levaillantii

Small numbers were seen on four days.

Fairy Flycatchers Stenostiridae

Yellow-bellied Fantail Chelidorhynx hypoxanthus

One was seen on Doi Lang.

Grey-headed Canary-flycatcher Culicicapa ceylonensis

Singles or pairs were seen on four days.

Tits and Chickadees Paridae

Sultan Tit *Melanochlora sultanea*

Four showed well at Kaeng Krachan.

Japanese Tit Parus minor nibicolus

Several were seen on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Yellow-cheeked Tit Machlolophus spilonotus subviridis

Two were seen on Doi Lang.

Larks Alaudidae

Horsfield's Bush Lark Mirafra javanica williamsoni

One was seen at Lam Ta Klong.

Indochinese Bush Lark Mirafra erythrocephala

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Oriental Skylark Alauda gulgula

Several were seen at Lam Ta Klong.

Bulbuls Pycnonotidae

Crested Finchbill Spizixos canifrons ingrami

Around 20 showed well on Doi Lang.

Striated Bulbul (H) Pycnonotus striatus paulus

Heard on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Black-headed BulbulPycnonotus atriceps atriceps

Several sightings at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Black-crested Bulbul Pycnonotus flaviventris

Small numbers were seen on six days.

Red-whiskered Bulbul Pycnonotus jocosus

Small numbers were seen on five days.

Brown-breasted Bulbul Pycnonotus xanthorrhous xanthorrhous

Small numbers were seen on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Sooty-headed Bulbul *Pycnonotus aurigaster*

Small numbers were seen on five days, all in the north.

Stripe-throated Bulbul Pycnonotus finlaysoni

Flavescent Bulbul

Pycnonotus flavescens vividus

Just one at Kaeng Krachan, but frequent sightings on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Streak-eared Bulbul Pynnonotus conradi

Small numbers on four days.

Yellow-vented Bulbul Pycnonotus goiavier

Four were seen at Rangsit marsh.

Puff-throated BulbulAlophoixus pallidus

Frequent sightings at Khao Yai, Doi Chiang Dao and Doi Lang.

Ochraceous Bulbul Alophoixus ochraceus

At least eight at Kaeng Krachan.

Olive Bulbul. Iole viridescens cinnamomeiventris

At least six birds were seen at Kaeng Krachan. This species' presence in Kaeng Krachan has had a

confused taxonomic history, and it may become a full species one day as Baker's Bulbul.

Grey-eyed Bulbul Iole propinqua

Small numbers at Khao Yai, Doi Chiang Dao and Doi Angkhang.

Mountain Bulbul Ixos mcclellandii

Small numbers at Kaeng Krachan and Doi Angkhang.

Ashy Bulbul Hemixos flavala

Small numbers at Kaeng Krachan, Khao Yai, Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Black Bulbul Hypsipetes leucocephalus

Six were seen at Doi Angkhang including some of the white-headed form.

Swallows Hirundinidae

Sand Martin Riparia ijimae

Singles were seen at Lam Ta Klong and Tha Ton.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

Common throughout and seen almost every day.

Asian House MartinDelichon dasypus

Six were seen at Doi Angkhang.

Red-rumped Swallow Cecropis daurica

Small numbers were seen on three days.

Striated Swallow Cecropis striolata

Two were seen on Doi Angkhang.

Bush Warblers and allies Cettiidae

Yellow-bellied Warbler Abroscopus superciliaris

Four were seen at Kaeng Krachan and another at Doi Angkhang.

Aberrant Bush Warbler Horornis flavolivaceus

Several were seen or heard on Doi Lang.

Chestnut-headed Tesia Cettia castaneocoronata castaneocoronata

Great views of one on Doi Angkhang.

Long-tailed Tits *Aegithalidae*

Black-throated Bushtit Aegithalos concinnus pulchellus

A big flock was seen on Doi Lang.

Leaf warblers and allies Phylloscopidae

Dusky Warbler Phylloscopus fuscatus

Seen or heard on three days.

Buff-throated Warbler Phylloscopus subaffinis

Three sightings on Doi Lang.

Radde's Warbler Phylloscopus schwarzi

Two singles were seen at Khao Yai.

Buff-barred Warbler Phylloscopus pulcher pulcher

One was seen on Doi Lang.

Pallas's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus proregulus

Two were seen on Doi Lang.

Yellow-browed Warbler Phylloscopus inornatus

Small numbers were seen on every day of the tour.

Hume's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus humei mandellii

Frequent sightings on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Greenish Warbler Phylloscopus trochiloides

Two were recorded on Doi Angkhang.

Two-barred Warbler Phylloscopus plumbeitarsus

Several were seen at Kaeng Krachan and just one other individual was recorded.

Pale-legged Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus tenellipes

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan and two more at Khao Yai.

Claudia's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus claudiae

Two were seen at Khao Yai.

Davison's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus davisoni

Several were seen on Doi Lang.

Sulphur-breasted Warbler Phylloscopus ricketti

Three birds were seen at Khao Yai.

Grey-crowned Warbler Seicercus tephrocephalus

One heard on Doi Chiang Dao and one seen on Doi Lang.

Martens's Warbler Seicercus omeiensis

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan and singles at Khao Yai and Doi Angkhang.

Alström's Warbler Seicercus soror

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Reed warblers and allies Acrocephalidae

Oriental Reed Warbler Acrocephalus orientalis

One was seen at Laem Phak Bia and another was heard at Rangsit.

Black-browed Reed Warbler Acrocephalus bistrigiceps

Two were seen briefly at Kaeng Krachan Country Club and four more at Rangsit.

Thick-billed Warbler Iduna aedon

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

Grassbirds and allies *Locustellidae*

Baikal Bush Warbler Locustella davidi

One was seen moderately well at Tha Ton marsh and another was heard.

Lanceolated Warbler Locustella lanceolata

One was seen moderately well at Kaeng Krachan Country Club and another was heard.

Pallas's Grasshopper Warbler Locustella certhiola

Two were seen at Rangsit marsh.

Cisticolas and allies Cisticolidae

Zitting Cisticola Cisticola juncidis

One was seen at Lam Ta Klong.

Golden-headed Cisticola (H) Cisticola exilis

Only heard in the grassland at Khao Yai.

Hill Prinia Prinia superciliaris

Several were seen and heard on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Rufescent Prinia Prinia rufescens

Seen twice on Doi Lang.

Grey-breasted Prinia Prinia hodgsonii erro

Seen twice at Kaeng Krachan at lower levels.

Yellow-bellied Prinia Prinia flaviventris

Recorded only twice, at Rangsit marsh and Tha Ton.

Plain Prinia Prinia inornata

Small numbers seen on five days.

Common Tailorbird Orthotomus sutorius

Singles were seen on four days.

Dark-necked TailorbirdOrthotomus atrogularis

Just a few sightings at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Babblers *Timaliidae*

Large Scimitar Babbler Pomatorhinus hypoleucos tickelli

A pair was seen at Khao Yai and others were heard.

Rusty-cheeked Scimitar Babbler Pomatorhinus erythrogenys celatus

Pairs seen twice on Doi Lang and another heard on Doi Angkhang.

White-browed Scimitar Babbler Pomatorhinus schisticeps

Pairs were seen three times, at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai; also heard on Doi Lang.

Red-billed Scimitar BabblerPomatorhinus ochraceiceps

One bird showed briefly to some at Kaeng Krachan.

Grey-throated Babbler (H)Stachyris nigriceps

One was heard on Doi Chiang Dao.

Spot-necked Babbler (H) Stachyris strialata

Two were heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Rufous-fronted Babbler Stachyridopsis rufifrons

Two were seen on Doi Lang.

Golden Babbler Stachyridopsis chrysaea

A flock of six showed well at Kaeng Krachan.

Pin-striped Tit-Babbler Macronus gularis

Frequently seen or heard at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Chestnut-capped Babbler *Timalia pileata*

One was seen on Doi Lang.

Fulvettas, Ground Babblers Pellorneidae

Brown-cheeked FulvettaAlcippe poioicephala

Two were seen on Doi Lang; also heard on both days at Kaeng Krachan.

Yunnan Fulvetta Alcippe fratercula fratercula

Several sightings on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Limestone Wren-BabblerNapothera crispifrons

One showed very well at Wat Pra Putthabat Noi.

Streaked Wren-Babbler Napothera brevicaudata

Good views of a single bird at Doi Angkhang.

Collared Babbler Gampsorhynchus torquatus

A flock of six birds showed moderately well at Kaeng Krachan.

Abbott's Babbler Malacocincla abbotti

One heard at Kaeng Krachan and two seen at Khao Yai.

Spot-throated Babbler Pellorneum albiventre

Two birds were seen briefly as they moved unobtrusively through the vegetation at Doi Angkhang.

Puff-throated Babbler Pellorneum ruficeps

Singles or pairs were seen or heard at Kaeng Krachan, Khao Yai and Doi Lang.

Buff-breasted BabblerPellorneum tickelli

Two showed well at Kaeng Krachan.

Laughingthrushes *Leiothrichidae*

White-crested Laughingthrush Garrulax leucolophus

Several flocks encountered at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

White-necked LaughingthrushGarrulax strepitans

Seen and heard on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Lesser Necklaced LaughingthrushGarrulax monileger

A flock was seen and heard at Khao Yai.

Black-throated LaughingthrushGarrulax chinensis

Two were seen at Khao Yai.

White-browed Laughingthrush (H) Garrulax sannio comis

Heard on Doi Lang.

Spot-breasted Laughingthrush (H)Garrulax merulinus

Heard on Doi Lang.

Silver-eared Laughingthrush Trochalopteron melanostigma

Some great views on Doi Lang.

Blue-winged Minla Minla cyanouroptera

Frequently encountered on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Scarlet-faced Liocichla (H)

Liocichla ripponi ripponi

One was heard on Doi Lang.

Spectacled Barwing Actinodura ramsayi ramsayi

Two showed well on Doi Lang.

Rufous-backed SibiaHeterophasia annectans

At least six were seen on Doi Lang.

Dark-backed Sibia Heterophasia melanoleuca

Commonly encountered on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Long-tailed Sibia Heterophasia picaoides cana

Common on Doi Lang.

Sylviid Babblers Sylviidae

Grey-headed Parrotbill Psittiparus gularis

A flock of around 20 was seen on Doi Lang.

Spot-breasted ParrotbillParadoxornis guttaticollis

Great views of a pair on Doi Lang.

White-eyes Zosteropidae

Chestnut-flanked White-eye Zosterops erythropleurus

Common at Khao Yai and on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Oriental White-eye Zosterops palpebrosus

Several were seen on Doi Angkhang.

Everett's White-eyeZosterops everetti wetmorei

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Fairy-bluebirds Irenidae

Asian Fairy-bluebirdIrena puella puella

Frequently seen at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Nuthatches *Sittidae*

Chestnut-vented NuthatchSitta nagaensis

Several were seen on Doi Lang.

Velvet-fronted NuthatchSitta frontalis

Singles or pairs were seen at Kaeng Krachan, Doi Chiang Dao and Doi Lang.

Giant Nuthatch (VU) Sitta magna magna

A pair was seen well on Doi Lang and another pair on Doi Angkhang.

Starlings Sturnidae

Golden-crested Myna Ampeliceps coronatus

Several sightings at Khao Yai.

Common Hill Myna Gracula religiosa intermedia

Regular sightings at Khao Yai.

Great Myna Acridotheres grandis

Common in open country.

Common Myna Acridotheres tristis tristis

Common in open country.

Black-collared StarlingGracupica nigricollis

Two were seen at Mae Thang and six more at Tha Ton.

Pied Myna Gracupica contra floweri

Small numbers were seen on three days.

Chestnut-tailed Starling Sturnia malabarica nemoricola

A flock of five at Doi Lang was seen by the leader only.

Thrushes and allies *Turdidae*

Orange-headed ThrushGeokichla citrina

One gave great views at Khao Yai.

Black-breasted Thrush Turdus dissimilis

Three were seen well on Doi Angkhang.

Eyebrowed ThrushTurdus obscurus

Two were seen on Doi Angkhang.

Chats, Old World Flycatchers Muscicapidae

Oriental Magpie-Robin Copsychus saularis

Small numbers were seen on six days.

White-rumped Shama Copsychus malabaricus macrourus

Seen or heard on six days.

Dark-sided Flycatcher *Muscicapa sibirica*

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Asian Brown Flycatcher Muscicapa dauurica

Three singles were seen on the tour.

White-gorgeted Flycatcher Anthipes monileger leucops

One showed well on Doi Lang.

Rufous-browed FlycatcherAnthipes solitaris submoniliger

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Hainan Blue Flycatcher Cyornis hainanus

Several sightings at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Hill Blue Flycatcher Cyornis banyumas

Frequent sightings on seven days.

Tickell's Blue Flycatcher Cyornis tickelliae

One was seen at Huai Hong Khrai.

Chinese Blue Flycatcher Cyornis glaucicomans

Four were seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Verditer Flycatcher *Eumyias thalassinus*

Small numbers were seen on six days.

Siberian Blue Robin Larvivora cyane cyane

A couple of sightings at Khao Yai and two others heard.

BluethroatLuscinia svecica svecica

One seen briefly at Mae Thang was a leader-only record.

White-bellied Redstart Luscinia phaenicuroides ichangensis

A female showed well on Doi Lang, with several others heard there.

Siberian Rubythroat Calliope calliope

Two singles on Doi Lang gave great views; also heard at Kaeng Krachan Country Club.

White-tailed Robin Myiomela leucura

One male on Doi Angkhang gave spectacular views.

White-crowned Forktail Enicurus leschenaulti indicus

One was seen briefly on Doi Angkhang.

Blue Whistling Thrush

Myophonus caeruleus

Singles were recorded on three days.

Yellow-rumped Flycatcher Ficedula zanthopygia

One male showed well at Kaeng Krachan.

Slaty-backed Flycatcher Ficedula hodgsonii

One male was seen on Doi Angkhang.

Rufous-gorgeted Flycatcher Ficedula strophiata strophiata

Three were seen on Doi Lang.

Taiga Flycatcher Ficedula albicilla

Singles or pairs were seen on six days.

Ultramarine Flycatcher Ficedula superciliaris aestigma

One male gave great views on Doi Lang.

Slaty-blue Flycatcher Ficedula tricolor diversa

Several sightings on Doi Lang.

Sapphire Flycatcher Ficedula sapphira laotiana

Three were seen on Doi Lang.

Daurian RedstartPhoenicurus auroreus leucopterus

Two were seen on Doi Angkhang.

White-throated Rock Thrush Monticola gularis

One male was seen well on a trail at Khao Yai.

Siberian Stonechat Saxicola maurus

Frequent sightings in the north. A male on Doi Lang was of the race *przewalskii*, which is sometimes

called Tibetan Stonechat.

Pied Bush Chat Saxicola caprata burmanicus

Singles or pairs were seen on four days in the north.

Jerdon's Bush Chat Saxicola jerdoni

A pair in tall reeds at Tha Ton was an unexpected highlight.

Grey Bush Chat Saxicola ferreus ferreus

A few were seen on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Leafbirds Chloropseidae

Greater Green Leafbird (H) Chloropsis sonnerati zosterops

One was heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Blue-winged Leafbird Chloropsis cochinchinensis

Regular sightings at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Golden-fronted Leafbird Chloropsis aurifrons

Just two singles were seen on the tour.

Orange-bellied Leafbird Chloropsis hardwickii hardwickii

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan and frequent sightings on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Flowerpeckers Dicaeidae

Thick-billed Flowerpecker Dicaeum agile modestum

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan and several more in Khao Yai.

Yellow-vented Flowerpecker Dicaeum chrysorrheum

Two singles were seen at Khao Yai.

Plain Flowerpecker Dicaeum minullum

Two were seen on Doi Angkhang.

Fire-breasted Flowerpecker Dicaeum ignipectus

Several sightings at Khao Yai and two more on Doi Angkhang. The birds in Khao Yai were of the race

D. i. cambodianum, which is sometimes considered a separate species.

Scarlet-backed Flowerpecker Dicaeum cruentatum cruentatum

Several sightings at Kaeng Krachan and the surrounding area.

Sunbirds and Spiderhunters *Nectariniidae*

Ruby-cheeked SunbirdChalcoparia singalensis

Three birds were seen at Kaeng Krachan and another at Khao Yai.

Brown-throated SunbirdAnthreptes malacensis malacensis

Only a single bird was seen, between Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Purple Sunbird Cinnyris asiaticus intermedius

Two were seen near Chiang Mai.

Olive-backed Sunbird Cinnyris jugularis flammaxillaris

Only a few were seen, near the saltpans and at Kaeng Krachan.

Mrs Gould's Sunbird Aethopyga gouldiae dabryii

Commonly encountered on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Black-throated SunbirdAethopyga saturata

Small numbers were seen on five days.

Crimson SunbirdAethopyga siparaja

One male at Kaeng Krachan was the only sighting.

Little Spiderhunter Arachnothera longirostra

A single at Khao Yai was the only record.

Streaked Spiderhunter Arachnothera magna

Several sightings on Doi Lang and Doi Angkhang.

Old World Sparrows Passeridae

House Sparrow Passer domesticus indicus

Small numbers were seen on three days.

Plain-backed Sparrow Passer flaveolus

Quite a few outside our hotel at Khao Yai and a few more near Chiang Mai.

Eurasian Tree Sparrow Passer montanus malaccensis

Commonly encountered throughout.

Weavers, Widowbirds Ploceidae

Asian Golden Weaver (NT)

Ploceus hypoxanthus chryseus

Four were seen at Rangsit marsh.

Baya Weaver Ploceus philippinus

About 20 were present at Tha Ton.

Waxbills, Munias and allies Estrildidae

Red Avadavat Amandava amandava punicea

About 10 were seen in paddy fields near Chiang Mai.

White-rumped Munia Lonchura striata

Many were present in paddy fields near Chiang Mai, and a few more at Tha Ton.

Scaly-breasted Munia Lonchura punctulata

Small numbers were seen on three days.

Wagtails and Pipits Motacillidae

Eastern Yellow Wagtail Motacilla tschutschensis

A single at the saltpans and two at Lam Ta Klong; the latter were M. t. macronyx.

Citrine Wagtail Motacilla citreola

Two were seen in paddy fields at Tha Ton.

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea cinerea

Singles or pairs were seen on four days.

White Wagtail

Frequent sightings in the north with a maximum of 20 at Tha Ton.

Richard's Pipit

Anthus richardi

Singles were seen at the saltpans and at Tha Ton.

Paddy field Pipit Anthus rufulus

Small numbers were seen on three days.

Olive-backed Pipit Anthus hodgsoni

Four were seen on Doi Lang.

Red-throated PipitAnthus cervinus

Three were seen at Tha Ton.

Finches Fringillidae

Spot-winged Grosbeak

Mycerobas melanozanthos

One was seen on Doi Angkhang.

Common Rosefinch

Carpodacus erythrinus

Several were seen on Doi Lang.

Buntings, New World Sparrows and allies Emberizidae

Crested Bunting

Emberiza lathami

Several were seen on Doi Lang.

Chestnut Bunting

Emberiza rutila

Three birds on Doi Lang were seen by the leader only.

Macaca leonina

Commonly encountered on the roadside at Khao Yai.

Banded Langur (Leaf Monkey)

Presbytis femoralis

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Dusky Langur (Leaf Monkey)

Trachypithecus obscurus

Several good sightings at Kaeng Krachan.

Gibbons, Siamang Hylobatidae

Lar Gibbon

Hylobates lar

Seen or heard on several occasions at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Pileated Gibbon

Hylobates pileatus

Several were seen and others heard at Khao Yai.

Old World Porcupines *Hystricidae*

Malayan Porcupine

Hystrix brachyura

One was seen really well in a staff garden at Khao Yai before running off down the road in broad daylight.

Squirrels Sciuridae

Grey-bellied Squirrel

Callosciurus caniceps

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Pallas's Squirrel

Callosciurus erythraeus

Three sightings, all at Doi Chiang Dao and Doi Lang.

Finlayson's (Variable) Squirrel

Callosciurus finlaysonii

Frequently encountered at Khao Yai and Wat Pra Putthabat Noi.

Asian Red-cheeked Squirrel

Dremomys rufigenis

One was seen on Doi Lang.

Black Giant Squirrel

Ratufa bicolor

Two were seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Himalayan Striped Squirrel

Tamiops macclellandii

Singles were seen on a few occasions at Khao Yai and Doi Lang.

Weasels, Skunks, Otters Mustelidae

Yellow-throated Marten

Martes flavigula

One was seen at Kaeng Krachan.

Deer Cervidae

Northern Red Muntjac

Muntiacus muntjak

Several sightings at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Sambar

Rusa unicolor

Several were seen at Khao Yai.

Cattle, Antelopes, Sheep, Goats Bovidae

Chinese Serow

Capricornis milneedwardsii

Two were seen at close range for as long as we wanted on a forest trail at Khao Yai.

False Vampire Bats Megadermatidae

Lesser False Vampire

Megaderma spasma

Six were roosting inside a big hollow tree at Khao Yai.

Free-tailed Bats Molossidae

Wrinkle-lipped Free-tailed Bat

Chaerephon plicatus

Tens of thousands were seen flying over Khao Yai at dusk.

Old World Fruit Bats Pteropodidae

Lyle's Flying Fox

Pteropus lylei

About 10 were roosting in the mangroves at Laem Phak Bia.
