Trip report compiled by Tour Leader: Rich Lindie

We kicked off this year's first tour to Panama with a visit to the very birdy little village of Cerro Azul, only an hour from the country's capital. As always, we had a very productive morning there, seeing a range of species that would help take our trip list to almost one hundred species by the end of the day! Walks along some of the quiet backroads in town gave us several tanager species – including Tooth-billed, Black-and-yellow, Speckled, Emerald and Carmiol's – a host of warblers that included our only Blackpolls of the trip, both Red-capped Manakin and White-ruffed Manakin, Isthmian Wren, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, Scale-crested Pygmy Tyrant, Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker (our main target for the morning), and – one of the highlights of the trip – a pair of Yellow-eared Toucanets! Stakeouts at feeding stations and gardens, on the other hand, provided us with most of the hummingbirds seen on the first day, including such gems as Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer, Violet-capped Hummingbird and Stripe-throated Hermit, as well as great opportunities to photograph other goodies, like Shining Honeycreeper, Tawny-capped Euphonia, Fulvous-vented Euphonia and Black-cheeked Woodpecker. A vigil for Violet-headed Hummingbird, however, was only successful for Nando.

Further east, and well on our way to our Darién adventure, an afternoon stop at Bayano Lake then produced our first Striped Cuckoo of the trip, several heron species — including our only Black-crowned Night Herons, the main target there — Pied Water Tyrant, a Thick-billed Seed Finch, and the first of many Bat Falcons to be seen on the trip, before our long but productive day came to an end in the small town of Torti for our first evening in the Darién proper.

Equally-long, though sadly not quite as productive, our second day in the Darién saw us journey all the way to the Nusagandi area and back, and onwards to Yaviza, not far from the end of the Panamerican

Highway – *well, the northern portion, anyway.* Around Nusagandi itself, the only noteworthy rewards for climbing up and down a muddy track were views of Blue-crowned Manakin and White-tailed Trogon; while a late lunch back at our hotel in Torti required no more effort than staying awake in our chairs to enjoy another great set of hummingbirds, including the ever-popular Snowy-bellied Hummingbirds, a Sapphire-throated Hummingbird, and a handful of feisty Scaly-breasted Hummingbirds. The best part of the day, however, was down near the end of the highway, where a couple of stops produced some wonderful sightings, the highlights of which were a handful of wonderfully close Great Green Macaws, an equally-close Laughing Falcon, and great views of all the following: Black Oropendola, White-eared Conebill, Spot-crowned Barbet, Black Antshrike, Barred Puffbird, Black-chested Jay and Ruddy-breasted Seedeater!

That evening was spent, for the first of three occasions, near the small village of Puerto Lara, where some of us had one of the most memorable steaks of our lives.

Day three of our Darién adventure saw us rapidly get back on track at the pace at which the tour had begun. One by one, our targets fell, as a day of exploring roadsides and various trails provided us with the best birding day of our time in the Darién lowlands. Along just a short section of the road to Lajas Blancas, the first part of our morning saw us bagging Orange-crowned Oriole, Buff-breasted Wren, Red-rumped Woodpecker, Ochre-lored Flatbill, Black-headed Tody-Flycatcher, Grey-cheeked Nunlet, White-necked Puffbird and Olivaceous Piculet, among others. A nearby trail provided us with great looks at Long-billed Gnatwren, Cinnamon Becard, Black-tailed Myobius (attending nest), Northern Royal Flycatcher (also attending nest), Black-crowned Antshrike, Pied Puffbird, Crimson-crested

Woodpecker, Black-tailed Trogon, Grey-chested Dove and Boat-billed Heron. Just before lunch, our third and final stop for the morning provided us with great views of the sought-after Dusky-backed Jacamar – after an entertaining little boat ride, that is.

The afternoon, whilst hot and slow at times, also gave us great birds; a visit to Nando's place gave us superlative views of Double-banded Greytail, and both Spot-breasted and Golden-green Woodpeckers, followed shortly by a wonderfully cooperative Great Potoo at the nearby village of Puerto Lara.

The following day was a very special one indeed! Set aside primarily as a day to find Harpy Eagle, we found ourselves making the very exciting, albeit rather long, journey to the heart of the Darién National Park. Being situated well beyond the Panamanian end of the highway, the park straddles a wild gap between the small town of El Real, and the Colombian border in the east. Getting to El Real, and onward to the park is, of course, not just time-consuming, but also pretty involved. For starters, we had to cover the final stretch of hardtop, in order to be at the port of Yaviza in time for a morning's boat ride down to El Real. Fortunately, since our ride took place in the cooler hours of morning, and since our motorised canoe was open, we took advantage, enjoying that section of the journey by making stops for new birds, including flocks of Greater Anis, Yellow-crowned Night Herons and several species of heron, before a bumpy ride on the back of a couple of pickups put a swift end to any birding for a little while. On the other end of the bumpy track, it was then back onto two legs, for a ninety-minute walk through the forest, all the way to the site of some recent Harpy Eagle nesting activity. Along the way, to and from the nest, we also birded the forest, stopping for Olivaceous Flatbill, Golden-collared Manakin, Golden-headed Manakin, Ruddy-tailed Flycatcher and Red-throated

Caracara, among other things, making sure the pace was enjoyable wherever possible. But it was the Harpy for which we had come, and it has to be said, that we did not waste much time; a good deal of the day was spent patiently waiting for our quarry to appear. Some of us spent part of this time tracking down Black-crowned Antpitta and Choco Sirystes, while others played sentinel from various vantage points. This, of course, lasted several hours, and even beyond our lunch (rice and chicken wrapped in leaves!), before several anxious moments were finally relieved by the cries of a Harpy nearby, and wonderful looks not long after. And for those who stayed a little longer, an incredible sighting of a female Harpy with prey in toe!

With the excitement of the previous day's events, it was always going to be hard to make the next day quite as exciting, though we certainly managed a good morning by any standards. Starting first at a private property on the edge of the Panamerican Highway, we began the day's tally with a wonderful sighting of a Great Curassow. Then, as soon as we had freed our vehicle from the side of the road, we went on to explore yet another private property – this time, the San Francisco Nature Reserve, also right on the edge of the Panamerican Highway. Jumping out of our car at the reserve entrance, one of the first birds to greet us was Whooping Motmot; whilst the next walk produced more great views of Barred Puffbird, White Hawk, Dusky-faced Tanager, Sulphur-rumped Tanager, Bay Wren, White-winged Becard, White-ringed Flycatcher and Panamanian Tyrannulet. Our final stop there, then yielded Rufous Mourner, Black-striped Woodcreeper, White-fronted Nunbird \*and\* White-whiskered Puffbird, before the time had come to leave the Darién. Well, after one more stop, that is – a quick visit to a nearby stream for Jet Antbird and a bonus Pearl Kite to boot! A lovely end to the first leg of our Panama journey, and the start of the journey home for some.

Part two of our Panamanian adventures was next, and we wasted no time in heading for the centre of the country, where several days of birding in the canal area awaited us. The first stop was Gamboa, where, after picking up two more team members, we jumped straight into some exploratory birding. Within minutes, we saw our first Cinnamon Woodpecker, followed shortly by our first Isthmian Wren and Black-striped Sparrow. We then enjoyed great looks at a Grey-headed Chachalaca before moving into the forest, where we spotted a slew of new birds, including Northern Barred Woodcreeper, Checker-throated Antwren, Dot-winged Antwren, Dusky Antbird, White-bellied Antbird, Bicolored Antbird, Spotted Antbird, Yellow-margined Flatbill (attending nest), Green Shrike-Vireo and Blackbellied Wren – all of which showed very well!

After lunch, and a short break at our hotel, a walk through the forest on the grounds of our resort produced almost as much excitement as the morning's birding, seeing us find both Rufous Motmot and Broad-billed Motmot within minutes of each other, Rufous-breasted Wren, Golden-fronted Greenlet, Black-throated Trogon, Violet-bellied Hummingbird, and a superb Purple-crowned Fairy, to boot. Outside the forest, we spotted several more familiar species, and enjoyed our first sighting of some visible raptor migration, as scores of vultures and Swainson's Hawks flew overhead on their journey north.

For our second day in the canal area, we started at the so-called Ammo Dump Ponds, where, in less than an hour, we racked up an impressive bird list, including our main targets: White-throated Crake, Least Bittern and Rufescent Tiger Heron. A bonus sighting, in the form of a great close-up of a Yellow-tailed Oriole was also much appreciated. Just around the corner, the famous Pipeline Track provided us

with yet more great birding and several of our targets, too. Top of the list of the latter includes Russet-winged Schiffornis, Red-capped Manakin, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Brownish Twistwing, Southern Bentbill, Black-capped Pygmy Tyrant, Streak-chested Antpitta (through the 'scope!), Ocellated Antbird (at point-blank), White-whiskered Puffbird, Great Tinamou and Slaty-tailed Trogon!

For the afternoon, we birded around the Summit Ponds and along the old Gamboa road, where Greynecked Wood Rail and Rose-breasted Grosbeak were the highlights. Upon returning to our resort, some of us took another short walk to see the Bat Falcons that were nesting on one of the building ledges.

Heading back to Soberania National Park the next morning, we headed straight up the Discovery Centre Tower, first thing, to enjoy the early morning canopy activities — and the relatively cooler weather! It was enjoyable to see the canopy, as well as some familiar species at eye-level, though there wasn't a great amount of activity, so we lingered only long enough to snap a few photos, and to grab views of our main target — Scaled Pigeon. Another bonus oriole sighting, this time of a Yellow-backed, was also appreciated. Down on the forest floor, a Pheasant Cuckoo gave us a runaround while a Moustached Antwren put up little resistance. At the Discovery Centre feeding platform, we then enjoyed great views of Rufous-crested Coquette and Long-billed Hermit, among other hummingbird species, while a walk along the access road provided us with great views of a few more species, including Grey-headed Kite, Spot-crowned Antvireo and Song Wren.

Post lunch, we headed down to the Gamboa Resort, and then the Ammo Dump Ponds, one last time, though things were pretty quiet at both sites, yielding only Scrub Greenlet, Thick-billed Seed Finch and Dusky-capped Flycatcher of noteworthiness. *Well, that and a few sloths, of course!* 

For the third day in the canal area, we started with a stroll through Metropolitan Park, where top species sighted included Orange-billed Sparrow, Golden-winged Warbler, Rufous-and-white Wren and Geoffrey's Tamarin. *Needless to say, diminishing returns were now beginning to show in a big way as a result of our early successes!* But this was a good position in which to be, as we set aside an afternoon for a visit to the Miraflores Locks, where we finally gained some insight into the inner workings of the canal and the enormous scale of its operations. Not that we took a complete break from birding, of course – other than the gulls, frigatebirds and pelicans noted during our time at the locks, a quick trip to the old Gamboa road finally produced good views of Lance-tailed Manakin, as well as a Panamanian Flycatcher.

Working further with the notion that we had seen much of what the southern canal area had to offer, we set out to explore areas far to the north the following day. To begin with, we birded the San Lorenzo area, and moved from there to the Achiote area – both at the north-west end of the canal and entailing a rather interesting journey across and over the canal – very near to the site of the new, and very impressive, suspension-bridge. In the San Lorenzo area, a trail into the woods gave us several new and interesting species, the best of which included Spot-crowned Barbet (of a different form to that seen in the Darién), Lineated Woodpecker, Yellow Tyrannulet, Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Streaked Saltator, Sepia-capped Flycatcher (apparently a new record for the area), Slaty-headed Tody-Flycatcher, Longtailed Tyrant, Northern Royal Flycatcher (also attending nest), White-winged Becard and Bay Wren (hopping around in the open, at the base of tree beside the trail!). The Achiote area was pretty quiet – only giving us a Black Hawk-Eagle and, eventually, Pacific Antwren, for our efforts.

The return journey then provided us with more views of Savanna Hawk (following our first sighting, earlier in the day), another Panamanian Flycatcher, and a vine snake. *Not a bad haul for our fourth full day in the canal area!* 

Our time in the canal area was to come to an end the following morning – starting with a quick drive to the hill country around the small town of El Valle. Checking into our fantastic hotel on the northeastern edge of town, we set out for a couple of hours' walk along the nearby Las Zamias trail. Being the middle of the day, we didn't expect to see much, and nor did we, but we did catch up with our first Rufous-capped Warbler of the trip, a couple of Tawny-capped Euphonias, and a Lesser Elaenia along the way.

Following lunch, some relaxing birding on a trip to the outskirts of town to an area known as La Mesa, and a site we dubbed "the dip", produced sightings of our first Slaty Antwrens of the trip, a pair of Plain Antvireos, a Spotted Woodcreeper, Silver-throated Tanager, and yet more motmots. A short while later, at the base of the Cerro Gaital trail, we then bagged our first views of Grey-breasted Wood Wren, a Pale-vented Thrush, Northern Schiffornis, Olive-striped Flycatcher and Green Hermit (males seen at a display site in the understorey). Sadly, a White-tipped Sicklebill – seen coming to a heliconia flower – showed only to me.

The next day, the pace picked up even more; and our morning, in particular, was one of the better mornings we had during the tour, as a couple of short hours along a small track near 'the dip' added Scarlet-thighed Dacnis, Blue-throated Toucanet, Russet Antshrike, Black-faced Antthrush and Tawny-

faced Gnatwren to our list, among several other appreciated species. Then, back on the Cerro Gaital trail, some of us added White-throated Spadebill, White-ruffed Manakin, Collared Trogon, and yet more Dusky-faced and Silver-throated Tanagers to the list.

Our afternoon wasn't too shabby either, following a trip to the Cara Iguana area, which saw us successfully tracking down both Tody Motmot (for unbeatable views!) and Lesson's Motmot, as well as a Spectacled Owl and a bonus Parauque in broad daylight. A short walk back towards town added Northern Waterthrush and Prothonotary Warbler to the list, too.

Changing scenery completely the following day, we shot our way down to the dry, flat coastal scrublands around Juan Hombron for the morning, where, in a bid to avoid the hottest part of the day, we set to work the second we pulled up for breakfast. Among the first birds to be found, two of our main targets were much-enjoyed, namely: Crested Bobwhite and Brown-throated Parakeet – *both of which we spent a good deal of time with*. Also in the mix were our first Groove-billed Anis, Plainbreasted Ground Dove, Mouse-colored Tyrannulet, Yellow-green Vireo and Eastern Meadowlark. It took a little more time to find a Pale-eyed Pygmy Tyrant, but we ended up with great views after all, and soon we were on our way to look for Veraguan Mango. This also took a little time but, thanks to a local landlord, we also ended up with great views of this near-endemic gem. As the morning heated up, we added several birds-of-prey to our list, the best of which were Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture and Zone-tailed Hawk – *both new for the trip*.

Our afternoon was spent back in the La Mesa area, where some managed to catch up with Greybreasted Wood Wren, Blue-chested Hummingbird and White-tipped Sicklebill.

For our final day in the El Valle area, we explored the roads in and around Altos del Maria. Things didn't quite go to plan there, but we did scrape together a nice selection of sightings, including those of our first Ochraceous Wren, Yellow-throated Vireo, Black-throated Green Warbler and Northern Tufted Flycatcher. Among the other species seen, White-tailed Emerald, Canada Warbler, Black-and-yellow Tanager, Tooth-billed Tanager, Mistletoe Tyrannulet and White-vented Euphonia were all new for some and enjoyed by others, all the same.

In much the same vein, a late afternoon walk on the outskirts of El Valle was enjoyable for the opportunity to slow down and admire some of the more 'common' species of the area, most notable of which was a Keel-billed Toucan that sat in in all his glory for long enough for all to photograph and admire at leisure.

The next day was, sadly, the end of the journey for some, as the central leg of our Panamanian adventures was due to come to an end by lunchtime. And so, with mostly a travel day ahead of us, we jumped at the opportunity to do a little more birding in the El Valle area, before the drive back to Panama City. The result was a combined list that included Blue-black Grosbeak, Rosy Thrush-Tanager, Mourning Warbler, Black Guan and Pale-vented Thrush, finishing off the trip list at the point very nicely. All that followed was a journey to Panama City, where we enjoyed a farewell lunch on the Panama City Causeway, and a flight to David for those going on to do the Chiriquí Highlands extension.

The third and final leg of our Panamanian adventures began with a bang, to say the least! In just a few hours along the Los Quetzales Trail, we added more birds to our trip list than would be fair to list here,

AND we enjoyed great views of just about all of them. A highlight for many was, of course, seeing the trail's namesake – a family of three, which we admired at close-range. Right up there with seeing this was our sighting of Three-wattled Bellbird – also well worth writing home about. Runners-up included Blue-throated Toucanet, Prong-billed Barbet, Long-tailed Silky-flycatcher, Green-crowned Brilliant, White-throated Mountain-gem, Black Guan, Spangle-cheeked Tanager and Yellow-thighed Finch; whilst sightings of Buffy Tuftedcheek, Red-faced Spinetail, Hairy Woodpecker, Slate-throated Redstart, Black-cheeked Warbler, Flame-throated Warbler, Elegant Euphonia, Lesser Goldfinch, Mountain Thrush, Ruddy-capped Nightingale-Thrush, Brown-capped Vireo, Yellow-winged Vireo, Barred Becard, Dark Pewee, Silvery-fronted Tapaculo and Acorn Woodpecker were all greatly enjoyed.

And that wasn't it for the day! Our afternoon at Lerida Farm was almost as productive, providing us with super views of several hummingbird species, including Scintillant Hummingbird, Volcano Hummingbird, Stripe-tailed Hummingbird, Lesser Violetear and Violet Sabrewing; whilst other great sightings included those of Sulphur-winged Parakeet, Golden-olive Woodpecker, Orange-billed Nightingale-Thrush, Flame-colored Tanager, Slaty Flowerpiercer, White-collared Swift, Blue Ground Dove, White-naped Brushfinch, Chestnut-capped Brushfinch and Yellow-bellied Siskin! Not to mention the wonderful floral displays in the gardens, \*\*and\*\* plentiful cappuccinos.

For our second morning, we headed to the La Fortuna area, to sample some of what the Caribbean slope has to offer. The weather was pretty foul when we arrived, but we plugged away anyway, and managed good views of Brown-billed Scythebill, Yellow-eared Toucanet (much to the delight of

some!) and Band-backed Wren, before the mist finally lifted. Not long after, we tracked down our only Golden-bellied Flycatcher of the trip, as well as a Spotted Barbtail, a couple of Lineated Foliage-gleaners, a gorgeous Purple-throated Mountaingem and another Silvery-fronted Tapaculo. Further down the road, toward Willy Mazu, a little sitting around and a short stroll down the main road produced great views of Passerini's Tanager, an Emerald Tanager to boot, a male Green Thorntail, several Montezuma Oropendolas, a single Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, and a pair of Olive-backed Euphonias.

All too soon, however, it was time to return to Boquete, though timing seemed pretty good, as more awful weather poured in just as we were leaving. Arriving in town, in time to visit Lerida Farm again, we worked on a tip from locals about recent sightings of Maroon-breasted Ground Dove but to no avail. Nevertheless, we thoroughly enjoyed seeing many of the same species we had seen there the previous day, particularly the hummingbirds – a new one of which came in the form of a brilliant Long-billed Starthroat. One last 'twitch' for the day involved a quick stop in town, where several Finsch's Parakeets were seen coming into roost in a single palm tree. Some also twitched a Lesson's Motmot at one of our lodge feeders!

We spent the following morning meandering along the lower reaches of the Culebra Trail – another excellent trail just on the edge of town. Right off the bat, we spotted our first new bird – a superb Golden-browed Chlorophonia, followed almost immediately by a Torrent Tyrannulet and a couple of American Dippers. Further along the trail, a Green-fronted Lancebill put in an appearance, as did a couple of Collared Whitestarts and a Slaty-backed Nightingale-Thrush – the latter eventually posing long enough in the scope for us to show a passing couple and their four-legged friend! A little while later, it was a wonderfully low Black-faced Solitaire that stole the show; while a White-throated Mountain-gem chose a nearby patch of flowers to visit on several occasions. An effort to draw in a calling Highland Tinamou rewarded only me with a view, but that did little to dampen the mood. Just outside the forest, at a local garden, a Magenta-throated Woodstar also put in an appearance. That was it for the morning, as we opted to head to lunch, and take a break for the afternoon, ahead of an afternoon and evening on Baru Volcano.

Our excursion up the volcano's slope was very rewarding, nabbing us great views of all the following: Volcano Junco, Sooty-capped Bush Tanager, Large-footed Finch, Sooty Thrush, Black-billed Nightingale-Thrush, Timberline Wren, Black-capped Flycatcher, Ruddy Treerunner and Fiery-throated Hummingbird. Not to mention the great scenery we enjoyed. Coming down the mountain, we were a little messed around by the nocturnal denizens, most notably an Unspotted Saw-whet Owl, though perseverance paid off when we finally had great views of a Bare-shanked Screech Owl, and then satisfactory views of a Dusky Nightjar.

For our final full day in western Panama, we started with some birding at a private property in the Boqueron area, where a vigil from the residence porch filled in the first hour or so just perfectly. At the hummingbird feeders, Brown Violetears and a Charming Hummingbird were a highlight, whilst a visiting Scaly-breasted Hummingbird was also great to see. In the distance, we watched small groups of Fiery-billed Aracaris and a couple of Crested Guan, interrupted at one point by a couple of White-crowned Parrots that flew into one of the trees in the garden. We also spent a little time watching gorgeous Cherrie's Tanagers. Down in the woods below, a short walk produced great views of Buff-throated Foliage-gleaner (attending nest), Smoky-brown Woodpecker, Orange-collared Manakin and Spot-crowned Euphonia, though a Rose-throated Becard was a little less obliging.

A little further down the main road, a couple of roadside stops then served up great views of Costa Rican Brushfinch and Buff-rumped Warbler, leaving us with little left to look for, so we moved on to the Cerro Punta side of Baru Volcano, where we rapidly picked up a Spot-crowned Woodcreeper and a Yellowish Flycatcher. Not much else was found thereafter, however, so we stopped for coffee in the company of a few hummingbirds, then made our way to our final stop for the day, Los Lagos. The main target there, Chiriqui Yellowthroat, took no time at all to find, and we soaked up a little time padding our list with species like Blue-winged Teal and Northern Jacana.

But for a short walk through some open country the next morning, where a mission to find Maroon-chested Ground Dove resulted in only adding Bronzed Cowbird to our list, our birding adventures in Panama came to an end the following day. What with great accommodation, wonderful birds and scenery, and comfortable rides, the last few days of our journey had been busy but very enjoyable, and a very apt way to end three weeks in the country!
