For most of us, the tour kicked off at the Cinnamon Red Hotel in Colombo, where we left at 8am for a drive to the Heritance Hotel, and then the Wallawa, to collect the remaining members of our group, before heading straight to the Kithulgala area. Once there, we had lunch, and then crossed the river (by pontoon) for our first visit to the park, where we quickly got onto our first Red-backed Flamebacks, and a Serendib Scops Owl not long after, not to mention a few goodies like Sri Lanka Swallow, Layard's Parakeet and Sri Lanka Hanging Parrot on the way! Returning to the river, we also saw our first Brown-breasted Flycatcher and a male Sri Lanka Junglefowl. After dinner, and back in the national park, a few of us tried for Sri Lanka Bay Owl but had to settle for a Dark-fronted Babbler and Brown Fish Owl instead.

On the second day of the tour, we started the morning off with a pre-breakfast stroll around a nearby resort, where several 'trip birds' put in an appearance, including our main targets – Chestnut-backed Owlet, Brown-capped Babbler and Sri Lanka Grey Hornbill. Following that, we returned to our lodge for breakfast, before heading out to the other side of the river once again. Taking the suspension bridge, for a change, we passed first through some very productive secondary forest, and then through a small village on the edge of the park. Both areas produced some good birds, starting with a popular Black-naped Monarch, a low-flying Black Eagle, a perched Besra and a couple of Sri Lanka Hill Myna in the forest, and a couple of Crimson-fronted Barbets inside the village itself.

Back at the lodge, we took a little time off in the heat of the day before making a final trip to the park headquarters, seeing our first Indian Pitta (in a garden) along the way, and an Indian Scops Owl after dark.

A leisurely breakfast saw in the start of the following day, followed by a 3-hour drive to Nuwara Eliya, where we checked into our hotel and went for a short stroll nearby – picking up a Paddyfield Pipit and a couple of White-bellied Sea Eagles for our efforts. We then ate lunch, and immediately set out for a spot of birding on the edge of town, where a Sri Lanka Bush Warbler put in a pretty lengthy appearance – *albeit an on-and-off one*. In Victoria Park, shortly thereafter, we saw yet more Indian Pittas and a few of the more common highland endemics, but not a single Pied Thrush! Making one more stop before dinner, this time to a spot along the Hakgala road, patience and persistence paid off when we all managed to grab views of a Sri Lanka Whistling Thrush or two.

The next morning, we departed for Horton Plains National Park at 5:30. Along the way, just outside the town of Pattipola, we were thrilled to spot a group of Sri Lanka Wood Pigeons sitting in a roadside tree. Up in the park itself, we were greeted by truly miserable weather but it didn't take long before we spotted the next of our targets, when a Dull-blue Flycatcher popped up on the edge of a small forest pond at our first stop. Things got a little slower thereafter, but we persisted, and eventually everyone caught up with Indian Blackbird and Hill Swallow before a brief stop in the rain on our way out produced one more Dull-blue Flycatcher for good measure. We then had lunch back in Nuwara Eliya, popped to the local racetrack for a spot of wetland birding, and ended up at the Victoria Gardens for one last attempt at Pied Thrush. Enjoying sightings of several of the species seen the day before, including Forest Wagtail, as well as our first sighting of Velvet-fronted Nuthatch, we enjoyed our time in the park, though it wasn't until the eleventh-hour that we could finally relax, when a lovely male Pied Thrush was eventually picked up!

Leaving the highlands behind the next morning, we made our way towards Tissa and the 'dry' south-east, with just one planned stop to make along the way. Unfortunately, the rain that greeted us in the morning had not let up at all during our drive to the Surrey Bird Sanctuary, and we arrived there to be greeted by a deluge and maze of wet and muddy trails. Unperturbed, however, the whole group set off to twitch a roosting Brown Wood Owl before retreating to the bus for the rest of the morning. A little drier, we ate lunch in Tissa, and went directly to the 'tanks' where, thankfully, the rain held off for long enough for us to see a great trio of owl species, and a host of waterfowl, including Cotton Pygmy Goose, Watercock and Pheasant-tailed Jacana. We then ended off the day with a long vigil for White-naped Woodpecker, a pair of which put in a stellar appearance.

We began our full day in Yala Park with the usual pile-up outside the park, though it wasn't long before we escaped the crowds by taking the first turn from the main road. And, despite wet weather throughout the day, we managed to find almost 130 species of birds and 5 leopards! We even managed to make it through our lunch break without getting drenched. Needless to say, highlights were many and included seeing several Painted Stork, a Black-necked Stork, Barred Buttonquails, Great Stone-curlews, Yellow-wattled Lapwings, countless Green Bee-eaters, Malabar Pied Hornbill, Yellow-crowned Woodpecker, Sri Lanka Woodshrike, Marshall's Iora, Ashy-crowned Sparrow-Lark, up-close Jerdon's Bush Larks and Jungle Prinia. On the rarity front, we were thrilled to find singles of both Daurian and Chestnut-tailed Starlings. A roadside stop on the way back to our hotel also produced our first Indian Nightjar of the trip.

Another night of heavy rain led straight into a morning of the same, and it soon became clear that we would not be getting to experience the dry south-east as advertised – confirmed by media warnings of flooding in nearby parts of the country and southern India. Spirits not dampened, however, we set off for Bundala National Park in the wee hours of the morning, where, despite the weather, the birds were good to us again. Indeed, during just a few hours in the wetlands and mudflats there, we picked up more trip birds and lifers than I think any of us had expected, including Indian Stone-curlew, Lesser Adjutant, Broad-billed Sandpiper and Small Pratincole!

Returning to our hotel mid-morning, we packed our bags and headed for our second stop in the 'dry' zone – Udawalawa National Park. As expected, it wasn't long before we found our first elephants, though yet more rain, and what seems to be an unmanageably spreading quantity of invasive plants, meant our experience in Udawalawa wasn't quite the same as that in Yala and Bundala National Parks. We ALL managed to catch up on Sirkeer Malkoha, however, and that's all that mattered. Our second evening excursion for Jerdon's Nightjar was a complete wash (blow?) out.

By then, fed up with the seemingly incessant rain, none of us was to argue with the idea of some early morning coffee and tea in lieu of rushing out into the field. Then, as if to reward our patience, we were given a window of clarity (relative, of course), allowing us an hour of birding in woodland near our hotel. The catch being that we didn't see anything of particular interest, save for a couple of Pale-billed Flowerpeckers (eaters?), so it was off to breakfast we headed, before boarding the bus for the final stop in our Sri Lankan adventures – Sinharaja.

Once there, we waited out yet more rain at our hotel, before popping down to Kudawa village, where persistence paid off with great views of Black-throated Munia.

Our first day in Sinharaja was, wait for it...a washout. Well, almost – we did pick up our main target for the morning, White-faced Starling, even if nothing else. And by midday, there was enough of a break in the weather to allow us a stroll in the national park proper, where Sri Lanka Scimitar Babbler, Spot-winged Thrush and Sri Lanka Frogmouth put in appearances. In addition, we added Crimson-backed Flameback, near Martin's Place, before calling it a day.

Our second day in Sinharaja, by contrast, saw much clearer conditions, and we not only enjoyed several hours of rain-free birding, we achieved the seemingly impossible, by not only finding all the remainder of the island's endemics and specials, we did so before lunch! Our last bird? A Sri Lanka Thrush, which FINALLY put in an appearance, preceded by our penultimate target, Red-faced Malkoha – a flock of which swung by as we were taking shelter from another midday downpour! Oh, and who can forget the Sri Lanka Spurfowl and Slaty-legged Crake that preceded that!

Somehow, despite the conditions, we pulled off a remarkably successful tour, and a thoroughly enjoyable one at that. Persistence and patience, by all in the group, payed off on so many occasions, ensuring we managed to find a record-equaling number of local specials (57 out of 60 possibles) – including all of the island's endemics, a handful of regional rarities – Daurian Starling at the top of the list, and a very respectable 236 species. This in only 11 days, 8 of which were almost rained out, and in addition to the great experiences, both cultural and natural!

A sighting near the Plantation Hotel for some of the group, and one for all of us in Tissa.

White-throated Kingfisher

Several fabulous sightings.

Common Kingfisher

Also seen well on several occasions.

Pied Kingfisher*Ceryle rudis leucomelanurus*

A few sightings in both Yala and Bundala national parks.

Bee-eaters Meropidae**Green Bee-eater***Merops orientalis*

Countless in the south-east.

Blue-tailed Bee-eater*Merops philippinus*

Sighted at nearly all sites visited.

Chestnut-headed Bee-eater*Merops leschenaulti leschenaulti*

One sighting in Kithulgala, another in Yala NP.

Hoopoes Upupidae**Eurasian Hoopoe***Upupa epops ceylonensis*

A few sightings in Yala NP.

Hornbills Bucerotidae**Malabar Pied Hornbill (NT)***Anthracosceros coronatus*

Sighted daily in the south-east.

Sri Lanka Grey Hornbill*Ocyrceros gingalensis*

Particularly great looks during our time in Sinharaja, where some individuals are fairly habituated.

Multiple sightings, and throughout the country.

Also seen up-close on several occasions in Sinharaja, though first sighted at Kithulgala.

Great looks at a few during one of our walks in Kithulgala.

Coppersmith Barbet*Psilopogon haemacephalus indicus*

A handful in the south-east – first in Yala NP.

Woodpeckers Picidae**Brown-capped Pygmy Woodpecker***Yungipicus nanus gymnophthalmos*

One sighting in Kithulgala.

Yellow-crowned Woodpecker*Leiopicus mahrattensis mahrattensis*

A handful of sightings in the south-east.

Lesser Yellownape*Picus chlorolophus wellsi*

A couple of individuals in the Kithulgala area.

Red-backed Flameback*Dinopium psarodes*

Sighted at all but two of the sites visited (Sinharaja and Horton Plains).

Crimson-backed Flameback *Chrysocolaptes stricklandi*

A couple of sightings in Sinharaja.

White-naped Woodpecker *Chrysocolaptes festivus tantus*

A great sighting of a pair in Tissa, and a well-deserved one at that!

Old World Parrots *Psittaculidae*

Plum-headed Parakeet *Psittacula cyanocephala*

One sighting in Bundala NP.

Layard's Parakeet *Psittacula calthrapae*

A handful of sightings, the first of which was in Kithulgala.

Alexandrine Parakeet (NT) *Psittacula eupatria eupatria*

Several sightings, scattered throughout.

Rose-ringed Parakeet *Psittacula krameri manillensis*

Sighted at all but the two rainforest sites.

Sri Lanka Hanging Parrot *Loriculus beryllinus*

One of the first endemics sighted (at Kithulgala), and seen on several occasions thereafter.

Pittas *Pittidae*

Indian Pitta *Pitta brachyura*

First sighted in a small garden in Kithulgala, before going on to be seen on four other days!

Woodshrikes and allies *Tephrodornithidae*

Bar-winged Flycatcher-shrike *Hemipus picatus leggei*

Sightings in Kithulgala and in the highlands.

Sri Lanka Woodshrike *Tephrodornis affinis*

A handful of sightings in Yala NP.

Ioras *Aegithinidae*

Common Iora *Aegithina tiphia multicolor*

A few in Kithulgala, and several in the south-east.

Marshall's Iora *Aegithina nigrolutea*

Great views of a pair in Yala NP – at one point, side-by-side with the species above!

Cuckoo-shrikes *Campephagidae*

Black-headed Cuckooshrike *Coracina melanoptera sykesi*

First sighted in Kithulgala, best views in Yala NP.

Small Minivet *Pericrocotus cinnamomeus cinnamomeus*

Several sightings in the south-east.

Orange Minivet *Pericrocotus flammeus*

A few great sightings in Sinharaja.

Shrikes *Laniidae*

Brown Shrike *Lanius cristatus*
Near-daily sightings after we left Kithulgala.

Old World Orioles *Oriolidae*

Black-hooded Oriole *Oriolus xanthornus ceylonensis*
Kithulgala and the south-east.

Drongos *Dicruridae*

White-bellied Drongo *Dicrurus caerulescens*
Multiple sightings, scattered throughout the country.

Sri Lanka Drongo *Dicrurus lophorinus*
Kithulgala and Sinharaja.

Fantails *Rhipiduridae*

White-browed Fantail *Rhipidura aureola compressirostris*
A few sightings in both Yala NP and Bundala NP.

Monarch Flycatchers *Monarchidae*

Black-naped Monarch *Hypothymis azurea ceylonensis*
Kithulgala and Sinharaja.

Indian Paradise Flycatcher *Terpsiphone paradisi*
First sighted in Kithulgala, then sighted every day during the last week of the tour.

Crows, Jays, and Magpies *Corvidae*

Sri Lanka Blue Magpie (VU) *Urocissa ornate*
Just two sightings in Sinharaja.

House Crow *Corvus splendens protegatus*
A few sightings.

Indian Jungle Crow *Corvus culminatus*
Sighted everywhere but for in Colombo and the two rainforest areas.

Fairy Flycatchers *Stenostiridae*

Grey-headed Canary-flycatcher *Culicicapa ceylonensis ceylonensis*
Several in the highlands, including a couple of confiding individuals in Victoria Gardens.

Chickadees and Tits *Paridae*

Cinereous Tit *Parus cinereus mahrattarum*

Also sighted on a few occasions during our time in the highlands.

Larks *Alaudidae*

Ashy-crowned Sparrow-Lark *Eremopterix griseus*
Sighted in Yala NP by some, sighted by all in Bundala NP.

Jerdon's Bush Lark *Mirafra affinis*
Great views of several in Yala NP.

Oriental Skylark *Alauda gulgula gulgula*
Nice close-ups of a few in Bundala NP.

Bulbuls *Pycnonotidae*

Black-capped Bulbul *Pycnonotus melanicterus*
First sighted in Kithulgala, though our best views were of several birds seen at Martin's feeder.

Red-vented Bulbul *Pycnonotus cafer*
Ubiquitous.

Yellow-eared Bulbul (NT) *Pycnonotus penicillatus*
Great sightings during our time in the highlands, most of which were in Victoria Gardens.

White-browed Bulbul *Pycnonotus luteolus insulae*
Several in the south-east.

Yellow-browed Bulbul *Acritillas indica*
Great views at both rainforest sites, including some at Martin's feeder.

Square-tailed Bulbul *Hypsipetes ganeesa humii*
Common at both rainforest sites visited, and also seen at Martin's feeder.

Swallows *Hirundinidae*

Barn Swallow *Hirundo rustica*
Sighted on all but three days – the three days we spent in rainforest.

A couple of good sightings in Horton Plains NP.

Several good sightings, and pretty much the first endemic sighted on the tour (at Kithulgala).

A few at Kithulgala, and a couple more in the south-east.

Rhopocichla atriceps

One sighting (on a night-walk) in Kithulgala, a few in Sinharaja.

Fulvettas and Ground Babblers *Pellorneidae*

Brown-capped Babbler

Pellorneum fuscicapillus

One sighting in the Kithulgala area (near the Chestnut-backed Owlet site).

Laughingthrushes *Leiothrichidae*

Orange-billed Babbler (NT)

A few in Kithulgala, multiple in Sinharaja.

Yellow-billed Babbler

Sighted on most days of the tour.

A couple of great looks during our time in Sinharaja.
