Tour Summary

Today was our very first day of the Western Cape Extension. Once both flights had finally landed, we made our way out of the mayhem of the airport and then headed towards Simons Town. We received the unfortunate news that our pelagic was cancelled for the entire weekend due to high winds. Although this was unfortunate, it was also a blessing in disguise, as it then opened up a multitude of

other options for us to explore. We got to Simons Town and checked into our exquisite hotel before embarking on our journey to the Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve. As we approached the reserve, we witnessed Kelp Gulls and a White-necked Raven. In the reserve the wind was gusty and rather fierce; we decided to take more of an isolated route away from the crowded pathways, and this led us through an abundance of flowering yellow Pincushion called Kreupelhout and many white flowers of the Everlastings. En route we heard numerous sunbirds calling, and we had fabulous sightings of Orangebreasted Sunbirds and marvellous views, as well as photographic opportunities, of a male Malachite Sunbird poised in a tree close by.

We carried on and came to a sudden halt as we saw a large male Angulated Tortoise insight. After maximising this visual experience, we endured along the road, and soon after we immediately spotted a larger but different species of tortoise, namely a Leopard Tortoise. In addition, we revelled in the fact that we got some fabulous views of a small family group of the extremely rare and Fynbos endemic: the Bontebok! Within the bird aspect, we felt we were rather skilled in finding Cape Bunting, Fiscal Flycatcher, Karoo Prinia, Cape Bulbul and Cape Robin-Chat. To top it all off, we had glorious views of the Atlantic Ocean from this point, and a couple of terns welcomed us as they flew around. Further along the road, we found a somewhat sheltered spot to scope out the hefty colony of terns. Within this colony, we got adequate glimpses of Greater Crested, Common and Sandwich Terns. In the distance on the beach, we checked out a Kittlitz's Plover skirting itself on the edge of the grass and the sand, and

we were also privileged to glance at two majestic pairs of African Oystercatchers. As we were making our way back to the entrance gate, we were in luck and observed a male and a female Cape Sugarbird perched delicately on branches as they swayed in the vicious wind. When we arrived back at our hotel in Simons Town, we were presented with a substantial and homely dinner.

After a superb breakfast, whilst overlooking False Bay, we again got back onto our tour vehicle and ventured in the direction of Rooiels. As we passed through Simons Town, we viewed the regular Speckled Pigeons and Wood Doves. We then continued with our route and passed through the quaint towns of Fish Hoek and Kalk Bay. We made

a brief stop in Muizenberg to take a look at the captivating Sacred Ibis, Little Egret, Reed Cormorant and African Spoonbill. As we carried on along the Strandfontein Road, also known as the 'Coastal Road', we came across the towns of both Somerset West and Gordon's Bay, and ultimately arrived in

Rooiels. We disembarked from the vehicle and were for once at a standstill as we felt the calm and gentle wind upon us. We then made a quick stop to get some formidable views of Orange-breasted Sunbird before commencing with our search for the famous, yet aloof, Cape Rockjumper!

As we walked and walked we could hear the faint and distant calls of the bird but had no such luck in actually seeing it; but with some perseverance and severe patience, we did indeed end up seeing the attractive bird through the spotting scope, below the immense mountain ahead on a large boulder. We gazed at this female for a lengthy period of time,

long enough for her to approach us for some very satisfactory photographs of her - our mission was complete! As we walked back to the car, we had brief glimpses of a Cape Siskin and sitting right above this little bird was a Cape Grassbird.

We then made our way to Stony Point Penguin Colony, situated in the seaside town of Betty's Bay. As we arrived at the entrance to the colony, we spotted a Southern Boubou and then immediately saw the highly endangered penguins. Furthermore, we saw four species of cormorants, namely the Bank,

White-breasted, Cape and Crowned Cormorants, followed by distant views of Cape Gannets which were flying over the open water towards the horizon. We then took a drive to Harold Porter Botanical Gardens, situated on the mountainside of Betty's Bay. We decided to take a walk through the lush gardens but wanted to avoid the large crowds of people and the troop of Chacma Baboons.

On our walk, we saw Sombre Greenbul, Cape Baits, African Dusky Flycatcher, Cape Robin-Chat, Cape Canaries, Swee Waxbills, Cape White-eyes and a pair of African Paradise Flycatchers. After an extremely fulfilling lunch, we set back out into the gardens. We came across some flowering Pincushions which were supporting good numbers of Cape Sugarbirds, and we also managed to get some better views of Orange-

breasted Sunbirds. We tried to see the very shy Victorin's Warbler, but sadly we only heard the bird call. We stopped briefly to have a look at the Chacma Baboons eating the Pincushion flower heads and

then as we neared the exit, we came across two Cape Spurfowl. We then hopped back onto the tour vehicle and enjoyed a very relaxing drive back to Simons Town whilst spotting a few Bottle-nosed Dolphins along the way.

After a lovely breakfast, yet again, we embarked on a scenic excursion along the famous Chapmans Peak drive through Hout Bay and Constantia Neck and then down to Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens. We entered the gardens through the top gate and along the way, we saw African Olive Pigeons flying overhead and we also had fleeting glances at a couple of Southern Double-collared Sunbirds. We covered a good part of the botanical gardens and came across a vocal Common Chaffinch before eventually finding what we were looking for: the resident Spotted Eagle-Owl. The owl was with a chick at the main entrance gate. We then continued to the top entrance gate and finally had a phenomenal sighting of a male Southern Double-collared Sunbird.

We then drove through the Mother City to the popular Strandfontein Sewage Works, and as soon as we arrived, we were greeted by Cape Shovelers and Cape Teals. Black-winged Stilts and Pied Avocets were in abundance and we were also fortunate to see the awe-inspiring Greater Flamingos in flight. In addition, we saw Maccoa Ducks, Southern Pochard, Yellow-billed Ducks, Red-billed Teals and a Little Grebe. There were also a couple of little brown species, such as Lesser Swamp Warblers, Levaillant's

Cisticolas and African Pipits seen on the drive. An African Marsh Harrier suddenly arrived on the scene and we followed the low-flying bird to try and get some good photographs of it. At the same time, a couple of Great White Pelicans appeared and we got some delightful views of these large birds flying over the water. Moreover, there were numerous Terns, such as Common, Greater-crested, Sandwich and Caspian Terns, as well as Common Moorhen, Red-knobbed Coots and one single Bar-tailed Godwit.

We left the sewage works in good spirits and we were highly content with our findings. We then took a leisurely drive back towards Simons Town and stopped off in a small seaside town called Fish Hoek for a late lunch before heading back to the Cape of Good Hope Nature Reserve. When we arrived in the reserve, we

paid attention to visiting a unique section; here the wind was calm and peaceful and within this constructive environment, we got incredible looks and photographs of African Oystercatchers displaying and chasing each other. We also saw an immature Grey Heron and a couple of appealing

White-fronted Plovers before driving to the south-western tip of Africa. We finally made our way back to our hotel in Simons Town after a full day of outstanding scenery and great birding!

We left Simons Town early to miss the majority of the Cape Town traffic, and it only took us one hour to get to the other side of Cape Town. Here we lavished in a Mugg-and-Bean breakfast whilst we looked across Table Bay at the awe-inspiring Table Mountain. After some panoramic photo taking, we drove to the West Coast National Park. Along the way, we had many

sightings of Yellow-billed Kites and Common Buzzards. We arrived at the West Coast National Park and not long after entering the park, we had impressive views of Karoo Scrub Robin, Long-billed Crombec and two vocal Karoo Larks perching themselves on top of a bush. We then visited the Abrahamskraal Bird Hide; and as we arrived at the hide, we saw a large herd of Common Eland. We saw a pair of White-throated Swallows actually nesting inside the hide.

From within the hide, we saw a diversity of African Spoonbills, African Swamphen, Black Crake, and Yellow and Black-headed Canaries! We then ventured forth to the main restaurant area before heading to the Seeberg lookout point. En route we had extraordinary looks at a male Southern Black Korhaan and we also heard it call. Once we made it to the lookout point, which overlooked the Langebaan Lagoon, we saw Little Swifts and a female Rock Kestrel. The pivotal highlight, however, was seeing a

Black Harrier flying below the lookout, offering us perfect views of it gracefully in flight. We visited the Seeberg Hide next, where we saw both Greater and Lesser Flamingos, a Eurasian Curlew and Little Tern, as well as a couple of Grey Plovers and African Oystercatchers. After some great sightings, we earned ourselves a fabulous lunch at the Geelbek Restaurant, and here we were entertained by the resident colony of Cape Weavers as we ate.

We went onto visiting the Geelbek hide, which was completely ideal as it offered us sightings of Little Stint, Sanderling, Common Greenshank,

Curlew Sandpipers, Common Ringed Plover, Bar-tailed Godwit and two Chestnut-banded Plovers. We exited the National Park and made our way to Ceres (the home of the famous Ceres juices), stopping

briefly for European Bee-eaters and a Jackal Buzzard. We took the turnoff to the beer and wine making town of Darling and on the way saw Blue Cranes (one pair with two chicks) and Capped Wheatear. Eventually, we made it through the Michell's Pass and arrived at our luxurious guest house in Ceres, and here we were treated to a magical dinner prepared by the hosts.

We left at first light and went on an onward journey to the Tankwa Karoo. While travelling, we made a brief stop at a small dam, and here we saw African Darter and African Spoonbill. Beyond this stop, we had two different sightings of Grey-winged Francolins which were standing stationery along the roadside – these birds are usually enormously hard to find, so it was an elite privilege to view them from such a remarkably close distance. Our next stop off point was at Karoopoort, where we, at long last, tracked down the Namaqua Warbler! What's more, we too saw White-backed and Red-faced Mousebirds, as well as African Reed Warbler, Bokmakierie, Yellow-bellied Eremomela, Long-billed Crombec, Mountain Wheatear and Southern Masked Weaver. We then drove along the well-known R355, spotting Karoo Chat, large-billed lark, Karoo Eremomela and the stunning Rufous-eared Eremomela. The 'icing on the cake' was indeed observing a massive, thick Puffadder moving

tremendously slowly across the road into the nearby bushes, followed by many angry birds!

We stopped in the Skitterykloof and were really fortunate to see Acacia Pied Barbet, Cape Sparrow, Booted Eagle and a pair of Fairy Flycatchers. At this point, it had reached well over thirty degrees Celsius, so we took a turn into the eccentric Tankwa Padstal (farmstall) and rewarded ourselves with a cold drink before venturing back along the R355. We had formidable sightings of a male Pririt Bats, Tractrac Chat, Spike-heeled Lark and an immature Pale Chanting Goshawk. Our next involved driving through adventure the Skitterykloof and Katbakkies Pass and as we neared the end of the pass, we pulled off at a gigantic dam

and were highly surprised to see a Western Osprey sitting steadily on the telephone pole. Moreover, we caught sight of a single Grey Rhebok relaxing quietly by the dam water. We took the road which led back towards Ceres and were at a standstill at another large dam. Here we watched African Shelduck from afar, and on the way down the Gydo Pass, we saw a gorgeous Protea Canary up close. *The Tankwa Karoo certainly delivered way beyond our expectations!*

Today was the final day of our tour! We embarked on a farm road which was just outside the town of Ceres and succeeded in seeing Malachite Sunbird, African Pipit, Yellow Canaries, Cape Sparrows, as well as having exceptional sightings of Large-billed Larks perched on the adjacent fence. Two dams were positioned along this road and immature Greater Flamingos were seen, as well as Cape Shovelers, Glossy Ibis and multiple African Spoonbills. We gave our farewells to Ceres and ventured back to Cape Town International Airport. On our drive, we drove through the Huguenot Tunnel (which goes through the Hottentot Hollands Mountains) and the final new bird we saw for our trip was the Black-headed Heron. We bid farewell to each other at the airport and hoped to see each other again on future tours.
